Address by the Headmaster - Mr Lance Veenstra

Mr and Mrs Theron, Mr and Mrs Shezi, the Chairman of the Board - Mr Campbell, Board members, invited guests, ladies and gentlemen and most importantly the boys of Cordwalles. We are delighted to have Mr Theron as our guest speaker and Mrs Shezi as our special guest who will hand out the prizes this morning. Both of them will be introduced more formally later.

Today we are here to celebrate the 2017 academic year and recognise the people involved in this great school. The best results are produced by a combination of all that the school and its staff have to offer, together with all the encouragement and support that comes from home. Many of the achievements of our boys and staff are listed on the "brag sheet" that you were given before the proceedings. Our boys are faced with the challenges of

a constantly changing world. According to the World Economic Forum, 35% of the skills necessary to succeed in a job in 2017 will have changed by 2021. Schools are recognising the need to incorporate 21st century skills into their curriculum to prepare students for the world beyond school. We at Cordwalles have recognised this and under the leadership of Duncan Greaves, our Senior Deputy Headmaster, we have had a critical look at our curriculum and have started to integrate some of the most important skills into every day teaching. Just as tennis players are given many opportunities to learn to serve before they become tennis champions, our boys are given time and opportunity to develop these skills throughout their Cordwalles career. We now do the maths programme, Number Sense throughout the school and next week the staff will spend the day doing Kagan Co-operative learning training. This approach to teaching differs to the traditional 'whole-class approach'. Research on co-operative learning is overwhelmingly positive, and the co-operative approaches are appropriate for all curriculum areas. Problem solving and critical thinking gives our boys the

ability to be discerning readers and thinkers. Creativity continues to be dominant and an important aspect of creativity is the ability to take risks. Young people have become so focussed on success that they are simply scared to fail. The need for cognitive flexibility is for the boys to be able to transfer their skills across different disciplines. They need to move beyond thinking of skills as being associated with a particular subject. The challenge is for teachers at Cordwalles to try to make the skills more overt and to ensure that they are being embedded in all aspects of the curriculum. Our boys also need to be committed and responsible. It is vital that they are engaged in the world in which they live and do not allow themselves to be complacent. We want our boys to be constantly looking to improve the state of the world.

2017, for me, will be remembered as a year we all tried to be the best that we could be. We often talk about excellence at Cordwalles, and I believe that many of our boys excelled in different aspects of school life. Our Grade 7 boys of 2017 did not disappoint in terms of the number of scholarships they were able to win to high schools of their choice.

We have once again done exceptionally well on the sports field with our boys punching well above their weight against much bigger schools. Highlights this year were the successes of our swimming, cricket, rugby and hockey teams who beat most of our local competition. The number of boys chosen for representative sides show not only the talent that we have, but also the passionate, well-qualified coaches and the well-structured sports programme in operation. 35 boys were chosen to represent Inland, Midlands or KZN in their respective sports.

On the cultural side we have 165 boys playing musical instruments and every boy participating enthusiastically in drama classes. The Senior Choir of 80 plus boys

and the various music groups sang and performed at numerous events and functions. The re-established Junior Choir sang with enthusiasm at the Easter and Carol services. Drama lessons provide boys with important skills which they demonstrate in the many plays and events we have throughout the year. At Cordwalles every boy gets the opportunity of being on the stage at least once a year which is indeed a great privilege. A highlight was the brilliant Grade 7, Gilbert and Sullivan production of the Pirates of Penzance. Once again the Art Department has made art relevant and authentic. Our boys' art work was auctioned off to raise money to buy a cheetah for the Hluhluwe/iMfolozi Game Reserve. The Grade 3s chose the name 'Cordies Hunter' for the cheetah we bought

Our year has been busy and full. Our boys have enjoyed our annual school picnic, Grade 7 Go- Karts, Mudman, sports tours, Market Day, the beautiful singing in the chapel and also the yearly Grade 6 exchange with St Piran's. A school council was established for the first time this year. Issues were discussed and debated and a number of suggestions from the council were bought to the school management and implemented. Thank you to Mr de Jager for guiding the school council and giving our boys leadership opportunities. The biggest asset that we have at Cordwalles is the wonderful group of teachers and support staff who ensure that the successes mentioned previously are possible. It has been an honour for me to lead this passionate and dedicated group of people. It is these people that ensure we have an excellent education product where pupils are encouraged to follow their passion and where focus is on the individual. These people inspire our boys to discover more and achieve more in a beautiful pastoral setting. Our staff value new ways of learning, but also know how important it is to impart life skills, in and outside the classroom.

In my experience, confidence is fundamental to progress, and it is only through sympathetic, yet still ambitious teaching, that boys can develop the confidence they need to succeed.

I am in awe of the staff we have at Cordwalles. They started the year with organised classrooms and planned lessons. They all had to get used to new boys, new parents, new colleagues, new subjects, new boarders and for a few of



them a new school. Every one of them just got on with the business of facilitating learning.

While lessons in the classroom are ongoing, there are music lessons, art lessons, computer lessons, drama lessons, choir, P.E. lessons, outdoor classroom lessons, remedial lessons, O.T. and speech lessons, outings, aftercare, hobbies and initiating social responsibility programmes. So exciting for the boys! As teachers they are expected to extend the academically strong and put supports in place to assist those who may be a little more academically challenged. They have to ensure that they communicate effectively with parents.

On top of all this they have weekly sports practices, matches, galas, marketing evenings, assemblies, newsletters and chapel services. They have organised fun days like Valentine's Day, Book Week and Project Week, which the boys have absolutely loved, sports tours and tournaments over weekends and holidays; Mudman on a Sunday - they all come together to help.

Who can forget the hours it takes to complete comprehensive and informative reports? At the same time lesson planning and marking continues. Many of them do so much more, but they do it quietly and without looking for recognition. We are very fortunate to have such a hardworking, diligent, willing and caring staff. Thank you also to the admin staff, the marketing department, the kitchen staff, the cleaning staff, the ground staff and the boarding staff. Your commitment to Cordwalles is much appreciated.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my management team for their support. They are passionate and committed to the school and the boys.

Today we say goodbye to a few of these special teachers. Mrs Sharyn Taylor stepped in and has taught English and Design and Technology this year in a locum position. Mrs Shirley Kempthorne has been a Grade 6 class teacher, IT teacher and Social Science teacher. She leaves us to take up the position of Sports Co-Ordinator at TWC. Mr Rory Bremner is going to teach in the U.K. to broaden his experience. He has been a Grade 5 class teacher and has been a very successful 1st XV coach. Mrs Ali Kingsley has been a Grade 4 teacher for the past 8 years. Her running of the Jackson Foundation and Safire programme has ensured that it has been the enormous success that it has been. Mrs Quin has headed up our Academic Support Unit and has touched many a boy's lives. Mrs Elsworth, P.A. to Mr Weaver for many years and my P.A. for one year, left at us at the end of the first term. Address by the Chairman of the Board of Govenors - Mr John Campbell

Mr Lance Veenstra, our Headmaster, the Board of Governors, our passionate staff, honoured guests, loyal old boys, devoted parents and, the reason why we are all here, our exceptional boys. Welcome to the 2017 Cordwalles Speech day. A special welcome to Greg Theron. We did not have to look too far for a guest speaker this year as it is a tradition for the outgoing rector of MHS to fill this role. Greg is a familiar face at Cordies as he has served on our Board for the past 5 years. Lastly, welcome to Mrs Shezi, the outgoing Headmistress of Ashdown Primary School - she will be handing out the prizes today.

This morning at breakfast, my son James gave me the ultimate vote of confidence. He said, "Don't worry Dad, no one listens to the Chairman's speech". Boys and possibly some parents, I have nine pages to work through, so please feel free to count as I go.

Speech Day is first and foremost a time to celebrate success and achievement, but also an opportunity to reflect on the year that has past and an opportunity to look to the future.

You may have noticed that a very special member of the Cordwalles family is not with us today. Mr Rex Pennington sadly passed away in September this year, however we are most fortunate to have Sarah, his wife of 68 years, with us today. Not knowing Rex personally, I only knew him as our oldest old boy, until his funeral where I learned what an exceptional man he was. Boys I would like you to listen for the next few minutes. Rex was Deputy Head Boy of Cordwalles, he was captain of rugby and cricket. He was hugely talented and excelled in sport, drama and academics. In matric he was Head Boy of Michaelhouse and vice-captain of KZN School's rugby. After school Rex attended Rhodes University, before being called up to fight in the Second World War. He was a Lance Corporal and narrowly escaped death following being blown out of his trench which left him with a cracked skull and in a coma. On his return to South Africa he learnt that he had won a Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford. Following his studies he spent 15 years at Bishops in Cape Town where he finished as the Deputy Head. In 1969 Rex was appointed Rector of Michaelhouse. His mandate was to soften school, and he introduced honours being awarded for academics and culture, not only sport. In 1977 he resigned and the Pennington Quad was named after him. He then served some time at St Peter's prior to being appointed head of Pace Commercial College, the first private school in Soweto.

In 2004, Rex was awarded the Bishop's Medal. The citation read: "To honour a man who has given his life to the service of others, in education and transformation and in the life of St George's Parish, a man with humility, courage and vision and with a profound sense of the presence of God and a man who in spite of disappointment and adversity lived for what was right."

As Mbali Shongwe, the Head Girl of St Anne's said in her address to the school this year, "We are raised to believe that success is the ultimate, but it is easier to work hard and accumulate wealth than to make a mark in the life of

people around you. The legacy of success is short lived, while a legacy of significance stands the test of time." Rex was an example of a Cordwalles boy who lived a life of significance. To our Grade 7 leavers, our mission here at Cordwalles is to create an innovative and nurturing learning environment, to inspire and educate boys to become men of significance.

Together we have built the foundation for your life and believe that with this foundation you can overcome anything. All the best at your high schools and we look forward to hearing about your achievements.

It gives me great pleasure to present the Annual Report of the Board of Governors of Cordwalles for 2017 to you today. There have been four changes to the Board of Governors during the course of 2017.

Roger Newman resigned in March this year. Roger joined the Board as Chairman of the Fund Raising Committee leading up to the Centenary year in 2012. Thank you Roger for the energy you put into the fund raising endeavours. The school has benefitted significantly from these over the past 5 years.

Graham Evans who resigned as Chairman of the Board at the end of last year very kindly agreed to stay on this year, assisting my transition into the role of Chairman. However, we realized early on in the year, that in terms of the Trust Deed, we could not have three board members on the Cordwalles Trust. Graham agreed to resign from the Board allowing him to pursue his new role as Chairman of the Cordwalles Trust following Fred Palmers resignation at the end of 2016.

Graham, this is my first opportunity to publicly thank you for the support and guidance you have given the school over 12 years on the Board, of which 6 where as Chairman. You lead the school through not only the Centenary celebrations but also one of the most significant growth periods in the school's history. It was during this time that both the Pre-Primary and the Junior Primary were built. You also managed the process of successfully appointing Lance Veenstra as our new headmaster. Thank you Graham

I mentioned earlier that Greg is leaving Michaelhouse and with this comes his resignation from Cordwalles. Greg we are hugely grateful for your contribution to Cordwalles, especially in your role in appointing our Headmaster, Lance, your active involvement in our strategic planning process and for being so instrumental in ensuring our inspirational Jackson and Safire boys have a home for high school. There is a saying that great leaders thrive in tough times. You have been an example of this over the past few months, thank you for your invaluable contribution to Cordwalles.

Our only new appointment to the Board this year is that of James Wardlaw, who has taken over from me as Chairman of the Property and Maintenance Committee.

Our last strategic planning exercise took place in 2009.

Eight years later and with a new headmaster, the Board decided to re-examine our strategies.



In April 2016, we formed a Strategic Planning Committee of 36 people represented by a number of Board members, teachers and parents. We analyzed the present situation at Cordwalles, much of which was driven by a survey that all the parents, boys and staff completed. This led us to review our goals. We had a hard look at the future of education, both in South Africa and globally and visualized the future of Cordwalles.

After two days of healthy debates and discussion we agreed on the following:

We are an independent Anglican boys' preparatory school and our purpose is to build a boy's best foundation for life in a changing world.

We identified the following key strategy areas:

Financial sustainability of Cordwalles:

On the backdrop of a very difficult year in South Africa, we managed to keep our fee increase to 6.8% which is low compared to the education inflation figure of 7.3%. Our primary revenue is from school fees and we must continue to market the school as aggressively as possible and ensure this is our first priority. However, in order to keep school fees competitive and increases to a minimum, whilst not compromising on our product, we felt we needed to explore other sources of revenue for the school. We will be looking into hosting holiday camps, leasing out facilities during the holidays, purchasing properties from which we can earn a rental income and opportunities for obtaining sponsorships. In our recent Board meeting we decided to also investigate the cattle scheme that both Hilton and MHS have run so successfully. Lastly, we looked at growing the Cordwalles Trust. The process involved building awareness around the importance of being sustainable and being on the lookout for opportunities.

Our second key area of focus was on the Boarding House. In 1947, some 70 years ago, there were 130 boarders and 17 day boys. Towards the end of 1974 this started to change. Until only 10 years ago we had 28 boarders and 250 day boys. We have experienced a consistent increase in demand for boarding over the past 10 years and currently we have 92 boarders putting lots of pressure on the current infrastructure. As many preparatory schools have closed their boarding houses, we see an opportunity to expand in this market and become a centre for boarding excellence. To many moms' delight, the Board has agreed that we need to upgrade our boarding facilities. Nick Grice has drawn up plans and the Board has approved phase one, which is largely a revamp of the current Grade 6 and 7 area, including upgrading the ablutions, recreational areas etcetera. Work will commence early in 2018.

Following our strategic planning exercise, there was a clear feeling that schooling is changing and we needed to adapt our curriculum accordingly. The next big revolution may be in the classroom. As George Harris, the headmaster of Hilton College recently mentioned in our interview, teaching is no longer about acquiring knowledge but about teaching our kids to think. We need to teach our boys communication skills, to be creative thinkers and to work in collaboration. Albert Einstein said "Education is not the learning of facts, but the training of minds to think." Duncan Greaves, our Head of Academics has made a huge impact on our academic programme. We have tried to broaden our learning platform to include our environmental classroom, we have revamped our computer rooms and are exploring more learning in the classrooms using the school's 126 iPads. Our revamped Media Centre is there to stimulate and encourage boys to read more.

Another area of focus is the integration of learning support into the classroom and the use of specialist teachers in Grade 6 and 7. Cordwalles has participated in national benchmarking tests for a number of years and from 2018 will look at participating in global benchmarking, to ensure that our education is of a global standard.

Curriculum development goes hand in hand with staff development which was our 4th strategic development area. Young children are greatly influenced by their environment and we need to make that love for learning contagious. We need teachers to be enthusiastic about continuing their own education and to be passionate about seeking better ways to facilitate and inspire learning for children with many different learning styles. We believe that educators who find joy and challenge in pursuit of their own professional growth inspire our boys to love learning too. We have freed up Friday afternoons for staff development and continue to send staff on courses, to not only develop their teaching skills, but also their leadership and mentorship skills.

It is essential that we develop the inheritance handed down to us by our founders. For the past 105 years the school has continued to develop and this impetus must be maintained. This led to our 5th strategic goal which is the ongoing development of our infrastructure.

Our significant project this year has been the renovation and expansion of our chapel, often referred to as the heart of Cordwalles. Many of you would have attended the Carol Service on Tuesday and enjoyed our first service in this magnificent building. The original chapel was donated by Tony Christopher's parents following the death of their son John in 1930. This renovation would not have been possible without the very generous donation of the Christopher and Ralfe families. We would like to express our thanks to these benefactors and all the other families who contributed to this beautiful building. Thank you to John Fowler for the donation of a stained glass window, along with the Michaelhouse board members who donated the large rose window directly behind the altar. Thank you to all the parents, boys and old boys who donated the pews. Well done to Nick Grice, our architect, for what has turned out to be an architectural masterpiece.

Our other immediate project is increasing the serving area in the dining room and some enhancements to the kitchen, ensuring we can handle feeding more boys. This will be starting this holiday. Other projects include renovations to the drama and music rooms. We are currently looking at improving the change rooms and our longer term dream is developing a multi-purpose, indoor sports facility. The school relies on external funding for the bigger projects. The PA makes a huge contribution in this area and I am pleased to report that the tennis courts have finally being paid for. I am sure the PA is looking for a new project for next year. Thank you to Rob Mitchell and his team for another very successful year of fundraising. I would also like to thank Simon Dix for his very generous donation of the electronic score board on Rugby.

Lastly, the preservation of our culture and ethos. As an Anglican Christian school we need to encourage all in their Christian journey towards faith, values and service, whilst respecting the religious and cultural diversity of society. We have extended our cultural days to highlight and showcase other faiths, their beliefs and cultures.

Our boys must be encouraged to develop a culture of compassion and giving and we see our relationship with Ashdown Primary School as key to this initiative.

As a board we will be focusing on these 6 strategic initiatives and building on them over the 5 years ahead. In closing, thank you parents for the sacrifice you have made to give your boys such a privileged education. We are very aware of the difficult times we are living in and are grateful for all you do to send your boys to Cordwalles. I extend my thanks to the parents who get involved at Cordwalles, be it on the PA or as a class mothers or supporting the sports games. Children observe everything their parents do, and whilst your children may not say much about your involvement at the moment, your support and presence in the school is a far more significant influence than you might think. One day they will acknowledge this to you. They are proud when your care is demonstrated through your participation.

Being a member of the Board is a rewarding and inspiring experience, but it also comes with great responsibilities and I express my deepest appreciation to my board members for all the time and care they devote to supporting the school and promoting its success.

I take this opportunity, on behalf of the Board, to acknowledge and thank all our staff. I often feel the first gauge of a successful school is the vibe or energy one feels when walking through the school.

You staff are responsible for this amazing energy and cultivating the special culture of Cordwalles. Thank you for the huge impact you have in our children lives. I express my gratitude to Antoinette Hankinson, our Bursar. This role carries a huge responsibility in the school and we appreciate your passion and commitment to making Cordwalles run so well.

Thank you Ruth Forder, for going the extra mile in everything you do for Cordwalles. Address by Guest of Honour - Mr Greg Theron

Good morning Ladies, Gentlemen and boys - the people of Cordwalles. Having being the Head of a school that happily receives Cordies boys as well as having served on the Board of this fine school for some time now, I know what happens here, and accordingly it is a great honour for me to give this address. Thank you Lance for the opportunity. Of course you have taken a chance Sir. I hope the Padre doesn't mind me saying that asking teachers and preachers to speak at prize-giving is never a good idea. We simply talk too much.

So with that in mind and with my reputation in potential jeopardy I have decided not to talk about your achievements today. Well perhaps specifically a little later. Please forgive that though - but I think you already know how well you do and keep it up gentlemen. I have glanced at the little booklet we all got on our seats

and it looks like another good year – well done to you all for every last little success. As a unit, together, you continue to make us all so proud. I hesitate to do this but I am going to ask the boys to stand up quickly and shake the hands of three boys around you and then sit down again.

So I will speak on something else. Some of you may have heard snippets of it before, for which I apologise. Hopefully there is enough newness in it. Let's start with Thomas Friedman in a book called "Thank you for being late." "You feel it in the workplace. You feel it when you talk to your kids. You can't miss it when you read the newspapers or watch the news. Our lives are being transformed in so many realms all at once." To which I could add, you can't miss it in our schools. I will return to this quote later. Let's digress a bit, as I am now going to tell you something about myself that I don't think anyone here knows. I am a huge Star Wars fan. Who likes Star Wars? In fact I found someone the other day that doesn't get Star Wars and I was dumbfounded - can you believe it? Boys when do you think Star Wars first came out? The answer is May 25, 1977. Of course we now know it was the fourth movie but let's just ignore that for now. The reason I tell you this is that I took my second girlfriend to watch that movie. It was a big deal and cost me a month's pocket money. Sadly she didn't like the movie much but I remember it vividly and particularly the robots. 40 years later I recall they were called C3PO and R2D2.

This was the first time really that robots were seen in movies. They had been spoken about before and were seen in comic books – usually making coffee or cleaning the house. That is how society saw them developing. The prospect of a robot talking and think like C3PO was so different - it was very exciting.

Now the simpler vision of robots still happens – I am sure some of you have watched Robot Wars on TV where robots fight for a prize. Some of them are fairly sophisticated, but, they can't learn. If we look at robots across the board though, this is not true because they are changing, and changing very quickly indeed – they are starting to learn. Let's test how serious this is becoming. When next you get close to a smart phone or computer again (and I warn you to only do this when you are strong and unchallenged by

life), go onto Google and type in "The Robots are coming". Then read what comes up. I will give you some of it, and it's interesting to note how much this has changed in a very short while. The last time I did this was before the MHS Speech Day on October 13 and I was overwhelmed. But, and here is the thing, the articles I referred to then are now way down the list on Google! There are very new articles from Bloomberg, The Guardian newspaper and Deloitte - all on the economic impact of automation robots. They don't talk about coffeebots. but rather about the direct impact of robots on the core of our existence. In fact they say that robots are quickly changing the way we will need to look at ourselves as humans. They talk about how many 100s of millions of jobs robots will replace. I think that is very scary. They also say which work, or jobs will be

resilient to the impact of robots and will survive them. These unsurprisingly involve genuine creativity or building complex relationships with other people or are jobs that are highly unpredictable. Even here there is a warning though, and warn they are not sure whether this will still be the case beyond 20 years. So remember this please, Friedman says it in a slightly different way. He says the highest paid jobs in the future are called stempathy jobs – those that combine science and technology with the ability to empathise with other human beings. Included in these will be those that look to inspire, to entertain and to communicate, which is right at our core as humans.

So the question this morning that is really important is the following. Does this all have an impact on the future of Cordwalles? Will robots teach boys in this school one day? Schools should reflect the societies in which they are embedded, so if societies change, schools should too. Let's assume what I have said about robots taking over jobs is true about society. Is it changing the way Cordwalles looks at how it is teaching boys? And it isn't just robots that are changing things – there are other changes to think about as well. Friedman mentions changes in the environment that need attention and in the markets of the world and how we do business.

In response we are well served by a strategy here. That's a plan describing changes that will happen in our future. And the good news, and happily, I think, our future is good because it looks at society and tries to match it. We can look elsewhere at other schools of the world which are changing to match these needs. Let's for example look at the education system in Hong Kong.

As you may know they work hard and are very intelligent in Hong Kong. They always finish near the top of world rankings in Maths and English, and recently they have embarked on a programme that will strengthen these even more. Importantly though, they have also identified other aspects to focus on in future – the ability to communicate, to change, to work in teams, to solve problems, to analyse and conceptualise, to reflect on and improve performance, to manage yourself, to create, innovate and criticise, to engage in learning new things all the time, to be able to cross specialist borders. These are all on their report cards.



Coming back here I asked some very sharp questions just now about our school. And to answer I think we are very well placed here at Cordies to look at these things and to strengthen them even more than is the case at present. Certainly I have heard lots of discussion here on this in the recent past and look forward to future developments. There is also another big change in the world which we need to look at as well. This is as a result of different groups in society homogenising more and more. They are moving closer and closer all the time and in fact are joining. So for example we see migrants everywhere and changing demographics. A big challenge is that cultures are blending which is always a big challenge - and especially here in South Africa where we have such a broad range of different cultures. We also have a history of neglect of some of these cultures here and inequality is greater in our nation than elsewhere. Indeed we still suffer from institutionalised prejudice and there are deep chasms in our social fabric. We really need to look at respect for each other. Others elsewhere are doing it but in South Africa we must do it more than they do. The question again is how are we doing at Cordies? And to answer I know we are looking at that. All the time. And we dare not stop.

We are privileged here. All of us. We feel loved and we help each other try and achieve a better future. We have a debt of duty to ensure that this happens evenly in our society. You will be required one day to go to high school, then to university or something equivalent and then on into society where you will be required to make it happen. The leaders of the world come from schools such as this and leadership matters now more than ever – at both political and personal levels

Boys, I am going to speak to your parents now but some of you may follow. The latest Stats South Africa figures on taxes here show that 5.5% of the population (about 3 million South Africans) pays 90% of the income tax. I am not sure whether this is sustainable as I am not an economist, but I do know that if we increase the 3 million to say 15 million or more, things would look a lot better for everyone - in all different ways. The alternative approach as one of the 5.5% is to get bitter and twisted. Many of us have. I understand that I am perhaps being naïve, and deliberately so as maybe this is now necessary to find solutions. But imagine a joint effort between everyone in our nation involved in the economy striving towards that as a goal, i.e. 15 million South Africans earning more than R20 000 per month. It needs inclusion, and adaptation, and robots I suspect, and education not still riven by apartheid jealousies and inefficiencies.

Back to you boys because this is where leadership comes in – and we cannot download this off the internet. It still needs to be done the old fashioned way – one human to another at a time. It continues to be important to have a caring adult or mentor in every person's life. It continues to be critical to have a coach. Self-motivation and practise continue to be just as important. Taking ownership of your education and career are real differentiators for success. You need to take control of this, your future and where your efforts are directed.

Of course working hard remains important, but the old rules no longer apply and each of us needs to look at the world and how we may need to change to match it. That's why leadership at the personal level matters so much more now. So is it all possible? Human beings have made transitions like this before and I believe they can again. Can doesn't mean will, but it also surely does not mean can't. So I encourage you to continue with the tough discussions you

have started here at Cordwalles. Keep looking to leadership – it makes us relevant to the world. We must continue to be grateful for what we have. You have it about as good as it gets here. And lastly, keep asking what it is that we can give to the world. The world needs us and we need to answer that call.

I look forward in my future to watching your future. To watching your star rise ever higher in the sky. All the best for your quest. I wish you well in this and know that you will not disappoint yourselves or the society in which you are embedded - one which looks to you for leadership. And to end... if I was in an assembly at Michaelhouse, I would say "and the people of God say Amen." Thank you for your attention and your patience. God Bless.






Leo Baber



- Seventh consecutive year that Kearsney's Maths and Science distinction rates have been double those of the IEB.

Cultural

The Kearsney College Choir was ranked 12th in the world by international organisation Interkultur in 2017. In 2017 the Choir competed in two categories in the Orientale Concentus International Choral Festival in Singapore where they earned two gold medals and won the Folklore category.

The Choir won three Gold Medals and were crowned World Champions at the 2014 World Choir Games in Latvia, the largest choir competition in the world. Kearsney is the second-most decorated choir in the history of the World Choir Games, with 13 Gold Medals and 6 Silver Medals.

Transport offered from Zululand, Ballito and Umhlanga for returning boarders on Monday mornings and a daily return bus service for dayboys from Westville, Berea and Umhlanga.

Instead of travelling to Ushaka in several busses and standing in the ever increasing queues on the first Sunday of term, we started the year with a day of fun water activities at school. Water slides, bumper balls and jumping castles were set up on Rugby and the boarders enjoyed a fun filled day with their big brothers and sisters. Boarding staff and their families were able to join in and the year got off to a very happy and active start.

Our Big Brother programme continues to play an important role in ensuring that our boarders are happy, well adjusted and that they have someone that they can turn to in times of difficulty. Dr Rob Pluke again met with staff and boys throughout the year to discuss issues of interest with both groups. His role is to help the boarding staff to develop into the most effective support unit it can possibly be and to encourage the boys to be kind, caring and brave enough to take the right action in all situations.

Plans for phase one of the extension and upgrade of the Boarding House have been approved by the Municipal Planning Department and are now being put out to tender. The goal is to start building work early in 2018. The project will take in the region of 8 to 9 months to complete, but we are confident that any temporary inconvenience will be well worth it. Obviously our plans have taken the boarders into account and we hope to keep any disruption to an absolute minimum.

Antoinette Hankinson is thanked for her assistance and support with regards to the financial side of boarding.
























The Music Department - Mrs Lillemor Blunt HOD Cultural Affairs



2017 was a whirlwind of hard work, functions and performances. This year I have chosen to let the photographs tell the story – our department in action.

Our senior choir maintained 85 members all year, resulting in auditions taking place for a chapel choir as well, consisting of Grades 6 and 7 boys only. These boys have done us proud; singing and leading both the Easter and Christmas services, combined choirs, and representing Cordwalles on their recent overnight outing to Clifton Nottingham Road and at "Carols with College". The revived Junior Choir added a vibrancy and excitement to these services and Junior Prize Giving. It is a wonderful foundation for the Senior Choir. Thank you to Mrs O'Donoghue for her hard work and fun with the boys.

Whilst thirty cheetahs were thought to inhabit this area, the collars revealed that there are actually only four or five! When talking to the boys, they agreed that turning trash into treasure was a good way of fund raising. Last year alone we raised an amount of R7000 for the school through recycling. We had another class competition at the end of the second term - the winning class had the privilege of naming the cheetah! A small group of Grade 5 boys came up with the idea to put recycling into action at the Hilton versus Michaelhouse rugby match. They saw a massive opportunity for trash to be turned into treasure. Luke Spear and a team of ten Grade 5 boys "spear headed" an amazing drive to collect bottles, cans and plastics from the rugby match. These boys gave selflessly of their time and put in great effort. They shared the story of the cheetah challenge with rugby enthusiasts all afternoon. It is this passion of the younger generation to make a difference in their world that gives one great hope for the future! I am so proud of you boys.

Our beautiful canvases sold for R37500 and added together with all the other earnings from recycling, a grand total of R55061.00 was raised.

U.K. Exchange - Mr Lance Veenstra

On the 27th April, I accompanied five of our Grade 6 boys on their exchange to the U.K. I spent two weeks with the Headmaster of St Piran's, Jonathan Carroll, and his wife, Doreen, old friends of Cordwalles, who have visited on many occasions. Jonathan arranged school visits for the first week I was there. I spent the first day at St Piran's in Maidenhead and I was also able to meet up with the Cordwalles boys. St Piran's is a co-ed day school. Day 2 was spent visiting Papplewick School and Hall Grove School. Papplewick is situated next to the famous Ascot Racecourse and is a boys only, day and boarding school. Hall Grove School is in Bagshot and is a co-ed Prep school. Hall Grove is one of the few schools left in the U.K. that is owned by the Headmaster. Day 3 saw us visit Piper's Corner, a girls only Prep and High School. A feature of Piper's Corner is their magnificent theatre. It wouldn't be out of place in the West End! We then visited Cokethorpe which is in Oxfordshire.

I visited Caldicott School in Buckinghamshire. Caldicott is a boys only day and boarding school. I was shown around by Sarah Bisschoff, one of many ex-South Africans I met who are now teaching in the U.K. An interesting visit was to Oldfield School, the only state school on my itinerary. Oldfield is very modern and purpose built.

The last school I visited was Eagle House in Sandhurst, Berkshire. Cordwalles has a connection with Eagle House, as Denys Parmiter, our second Headmaster, was Headmaster of Eagle House before he came to Cordwalles. Eagle House is situated in the grounds of the well-known Wellington College. It was also great to meet up with James Guest who taught at Cordwalles in the late 2000's. Eagle House also happens to be where my daughter Jemma, did her GAP year.

I was invited to attend a St Piran's Old Boy's luncheon which was held at the Royal Airforce Club in London. It was hosted by a previous Governor of Windsor Castle, Air Marshall Sir Ian Macfayden. I addressed the very formal gathering and spoke about the history of Cordwalles and our connection with St Piran's.

On the last weekend, I was based in London and attended a Cordwalles Old Boys' Dinner in Northcote.

This trip was hugely beneficial. I went with the purpose of not only observing certain departments, but seeing the whole school. In each school I looked at their pastoral care programmes, marketing, academic support systems, sport as part of the school day, teaching loads, bursaries, management systems, affordability, differentiation, boarding houses, sports programmes and facilities, design and technology and outdoor education programmes.

Some of the things I observed: Learning styles and habits are constantly reinforced through posters and literature and are in constant use in everyday language. Some of the challenges we are going through have been experienced by these schools recently and they have had to change their mind-set and adapt accordingly. Schools are open 50 weeks a year, open earlier in the morning and close later in the evening to suit working parents. Very few schools have IT rooms but devices are taken to classrooms. Lots of outings and environmental tours happen. There is Saturday school every week and sport takes place on a Saturday afternoon. Some of the most expensive schools in the U.K. use prefabs as classrooms, have bunk beds in their boarding houses and they all experience parking problems! I also learnt that we do a lot of things well at Cordwalles and that was most satisfying.











U.K. Exchange - Reports from boys that went on Exchange

The highlight of my exchange trip to the U.K. was the day that I spent in London.

After a few days of settling in with my Exchange family the Moores - and spending some days at school at St Piran's, it was time for my much anticipated day-trip to London. We travelled to London from Maidenhead by overland train to Paddington Station, where we hopped onto a tube, which is an underground train. Our first attraction visited was Madame Tussaud's, where there are lifelike wax statues of famous celebrities. My favourite statue was Bob Marley. We then visited various famous landmarks. 
Environmental Education - Mrs Sam Hubble

The highlight of their lessons and outdoor time is always fires. We do a thorough session on fire safety to ensure that the best measures are taken to keep the boys and our forest safe! It's then learning about different types of fires for different uses, how to light them and this will often lead to some form of outdoor cooking - which tends to be deliciously sweet and sticky! Knots, map reading and compass skills are covered and we have fun learning how to track and stalk too. These are just a few of the learning areas that we have covered this year, but in all of it we KEEP SAFE, HAVE FUN and RESPECT OURSELVES, EACH OTHER and THE ENVIRON-MENT. - Season with orienteering and team work



Cordwalles Cricket Report

The 2017 Cordwalles Cricket season was a very successful one. 

Cross Country Report

Jesse Owens, the legendary American Olympic gold medallist once said "We all have dreams. But in order to make dreams come into reality, it takes an awful lot of determination, dedication, self-discipline and effort." The sport of Cross Country, particularly at Cordwalles, is the perfect illustration of this quote. Each boy has his own dream, be it winning his age group at the next meeting or simply improving on his personal best time on the cross country course. With determination, dedication, self-discipline and effort many boys saw their dreams coming into reality this season.

The cross country course at Cordwalles is a scenic but challenging 2km loop, dipping down through our beautiful, increasingly indigenous forest, passing the outdoor classroom and climbing steeply back up to Rugby field. The boys run this course, challenging themselves to beat their personal best times. Each run is logged and consistent effort is rewarded as boys are awarded a certificate for completing 50km, 100km, 150km, 200km and, most impressively, 250km. While the cross country team is initially chosen according to the fastest times on this course, any boy who would like to participate is welcomed on to the team.

So, it was with a team of over 50 boys that we competed at New Hanover Preparatory School, Laddsworth Primary School and to end the season, on our home soil at The Cordwalles Forest Run. Each boy worked hard at achieving his own dream, some placing competitively in their age groups, and others accumulating kilometres to reach for their certificates. Their dedication and self-discipline was certainly a reason to feel proud.

Our inter-house cross country event was a festive afternoon, with every boy from Grade 3 to 7 earning points for his house, and many young boys from Grade 1 and 2 taking part voluntarily. Several parents got into the spirit of the event, with lain Bromage and Yolandi Boshoff winning the parents' race. Hunter Conway showed his determination by setting a new U7 record, running the 1km route in 6 minutes and 3 seconds. Close finishes and friendly rivalry were the order of the day, with Jacksons eventually claiming the trophy.

The inter-schools meeting at Cordwalles was our final event of the season. The Cordwalles cross country route is a popular one and this year it attracted over 650 runners. While the children strove to turn their running dreams into reality, the Cordwalles staff showed off their dedication and effort, hosting a happy, healthy and challenging afternoon of running. The efforts of both the staff and the boys made me incredibly proud to be associated with the Cordwalles Cross Country team.

Notable mention must go to the following boys:


 Fortune Mpofu - an unbelievable player with a huge future in rugby, he led our defensive line and made many try saving tackles.


Tennis Report





REX PENNINGTON - 1923-2017

CORDWALLES 1934-1936

It was with great sadness in September that we reported the passing of Rex Pennington. Rex was a regular visitor and participant in Cordwalles life, only recently joining in with the Gaudy Old Boys' Dinner, where he enjoyed being wheeled down the corridor to view the developments at the chapel.

Rex joined Cordwalles in 1934 before heading off to Michaelhouse at the start of 1937. He was the nephew of the famous teaching brothers, Gerald and Maurice Pennington who were both Cordwalles institutions. At Michaelhouse, Rex continued his love of sport, in particular cricket, playing for the 1st Team as well as tennis, squash and was a member of the athletics team. Rex was a scholar and had a love of the dramatic arts.

On leaving school Rex went to Italy as part of the Natal Carbineers, but was injured in 1943 following a posting to the Intelligence Section. As a recipient of the Rhodes Scholarship, Rex went to Oxford University to read a PPE Degree, graduating with an MA. During this time he won his Blues for both squash and a Badminton.

During the next few years, Rex met and, in 1949, married Sarah and he took up a post in the US at Cassady School. Four years later the couple moved back to South Africa and Rex went to Bishops in Cape Town, where he became Deputy Headmaster in 1965.

In 1969, Rex returned to Michaelhouse as Rector. He was responsible for the cessation of boys caning boys. He opened the doors to the possibility of allowing boys of other races to attend the school and he further developed the system of awarding Honours in all areas of school life. Leaving Michaelhouse in 1977, Rex took up a teaching post at St. Peter's Prep in Johannesburg and in 1980 was appointed Head of PACE Commercial College in Soweto, retiring in 1985 when, due to the political turmoil of the time, the school was closed down. Rex remained occupied with the work he undertook on various school Boards and in 2004, he was awarded the Bishop's Medal by the Bishop of Johannesburg.


Rex leaves behind his wife Sarah and their five children and 12 grandchildren. He was a man of many talents, his smile and humour infectious and he will be dearly missed by the many people whose lives he touched.

Rex and Sarah returned to Pietermaritzburg some 12 years ago, during which time, Rex was a stalwart of all things Cordwalles. One of my happiest memories is of Rex on his zimmer frame moving around the dining room at an OB Dinner and, having promised his wife Sarah, I drove him home, escorting him, zimmer frame and all, to his front door laughing all the way - more than anything he had spent an evening indulging his childhood memories with others, and whilst many years in age apart from others attending, in reality, for the briefest of moments, they were all the same. He loved to be at the centre of things and his last Cordwalles outing was at the OB dinner last year, when he was wheeled happily on an office chair, down to inspect progress on the chapel. He will be forever missed and as a result, he has become part of the fabric, and the heart and soul of Cordwalles.






