Mrs Martin, the Chairman of the Board, Mr Campbell, Board members, invited guests, ladies and gentlemen and most importantly, the boys of Cordwalles. We are delighted to have Mrs Martin as our guest speaker today. Debbie is recognised as an outstanding educational leader who is committed and dedicated to the teaching profession. For me it is extra special having Debbie and her husband, Alan here as I taught with both of them and their sons are both Cordwalles Old Boys. Mrs Martin will be introduced more formally later on.

Today we are here to celebrate the 2018 academic year and recognise the people involved in Cordwalles. Many of the achievements of our boys and staff are listed in the "Brag Sheet" that you would have found on your chairs at the beginning of the ceremony.

My job as the Headmaster is to report back on the past year and I realise this can be quite dry, especially for the young boys sitting here. I want all the boys sitting in front of me to take some time to reflect back on your year. I want you to think about the successes you might have had, no matter how big or small. The boys coming up to receive certificates today will be celebrating their successes and achievements and this is excellent. Many of you won't receive an award but this doesn't mean you haven't had success this year. Perhaps you read a record number of library books, or you hit your first ever six, or you swam a length of the pool for the first time or you caught your biggest fish, or improved your marks significantly or played a musical instrument in front of an audience for the first time. It might even be that you regularly display the core values of Cordwalles, especially the core value of RESPECT. These are all things to be proud of and just because you are not going to receive a certificate, it doesn't mean these things are meaningless. I want you boys to take a few seconds and think of three things you would give yourself a certificate for. This is something you can be proud of.

The Cordwalles community ended the Christmas holidays on a very sad note when we heard of Mr Mtshali's death. Mr Mtshali had taught at Cordwalles for the past 3 years. Like a tight knit family the boys, staff and parents faced this tragedy together to support one another. Just like any family we are not perfect and we have our differences. But at this very difficult time it was again illustrated what a special school Cordwalles is. Lala kahle Mnumzane Mtshali.

2018 will also be remembered for some exciting developments. We went through the arduous task of Umalusi. (I see some wry smiles from fellow heads who have been through this process as well) After months and months of painstaking work by the staff we received our accreditation. We completed the extensions to

the chapel and as a visiting minister said recently, we have one of the most beautiful chapels he has ever seen. Phase 1 of the boarding house renovations is finished and

we now have, in the minds of many, a world class facility for the Grade 6 and 7 boarders.

We now need to turn to our future here at Cordwalles. We are very excited about what lies ahead. We are opening a Grade RRR in 2019. It will take some getting used to having 3 year olds on campus. Developing our staff professionally and personally is very important us. Our professional development programme continues to grow as we want to uplift and nurture staff for the benefit of our boys.

The culture and ethos of Cordwalles is something we work on every day. Growing young boys into significant men is central to what we do at Cordwalles and we need to regularly remind ourselves of the core values of our school. The culture of a school is a hidden force which legitimises and enforces behaviours which ultimately determine the long term success of any organisation.

It is imperative that we develop a positive culture at Cordwalles. We must understand that every action taken today will determine our culture and ultimately our success in the future. The culture of giving is very much part of an Anglican Church school. I would like to thank our community who give so willingly in all areas to benefit people in need. We have handed out a record number of St George certificates this year. A St George certificate is awarded to boys who uphold the Cordwalles values which contribute to the ethos and culture of the school. As part of our diversity programme we introduced awareness months this year. We focused on child cancer, the Pink Drive, the plight of the elderly, Women's Month and of course ended the year with Movember. As you would have noticed some of the male staff members have sported moustaches with varying degrees of success. Mr Nell won hands down, but rumour has it, he has been growing his moustache since June!

As you are aware we have made wholesale changes to our curriculum.

I would like to thank Mr Greaves, the Academic Management committee and the Cordwalles staff who have been brave and forward thinking enough, to embrace and implement these changes.

Our Grade 7 boys of 2018 have done us proud by achieving 9 scholarships and merit bursaries to various high schools. Certainly an excellent achievement. These fine achievements endorse what we are doing as a school and furthermore, the continued very positive comments from our high schools clearly indicate that Cordwalles is preparing its boys exceptionally well for what awaits them at high school and beyond.

Sport at Cordwalles continues to thrive. As a small school we are able to compete against our much bigger rival schools. More importantly is that every boy has a chance to participate, and in doing so, healthy physical activity becomes a habit. Once again we have had a large number of boys representing Cordwalles in various provincial teams.

The cultural side of the school is an equally important component in our quest for a holistic education. Our boys each had a chance to showcase their talents on stage in Grandparents' Day shows, the Junior Primary play, "Ebenezer", and the brilliant Grade 7 production of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat". Who will forget watching the choir - made up of 90 boys-singing at numerous events and then ending the year off in magnificent fashion at our Carol Service? These are ways we differentiate ourselves. Art is also one of these areas. You will see the boys' art displayed all around the school. It is relevant and authentic.

The staff at Cordwalles are a special group of men and women who give tirelessly to the boys of this school. To the staff, thank you for the work that you do. I do believe that each one of them strive to be "Boy Specialists", educating boys in the best way possible so that they learn best as boys. Our administration staff and support staff also go the extra mile to make sure that this well-oiled machine keeps on running.

Today we say goodbye to a group of interns and boarder masters who have contributed to the growth of our boys over the last couple of years. In the Junior Primary we take leave of interns Mrs Kyle, Ms Uys, Ms Lalbeharee, boarder masters Messrs Dedekind, Cumings and Hudson. In the Senior Primary, Mr Clark and Mr Greyvenstein leave us. Mr Greyvenstein is teaching in Hong Kong and Mr Clark and his wife are going to teach in Vietnam. Mrs Hubbard, who has been teaching French part time here at Cordwalles, is leaving for the United Kingdom to be closer to her family. We wish them all well and thank them for their contribution to Cordwalles.

Mrs Winnie Mlawo from the cleaning department retires after

twenty-one and a half years of loyal service. We thank her for her dedicated service. We said our farewells to her at a special tea where the whole school was present.

Mrs Van Vuuren goes on maternity leave for the first six months of next year and we wish her well as she awaits the birth of her second child. Mrs Taylor will be her locum next year. Mrs Chapman leaves us at the end of the first term and her place will be taken by Mr Henderson-Everill who comes to us from Cowan House. We thank Mrs Chapman for her innovative and creative teaching. Her classroom has been a safe place for her boys to learn and make mistakes, whilst having fun. Mrs Holdsworth moves from Grade RR to teach our first Grade RRR. We welcome Mrs Hull from Hilltops Pre-Primary to teach our second Grade R class.

At the recent Heads' Conference in Johannesburg I was lucky enough to listen to Simon Henderson, the Headmaster of Eton College, talk on the topic, "Is a liberal education still relevant in the modern world"?

Looking through our Deed of Trust that was written in 1912, I was reminded what our objective was as a school. The object of Cordwalles is to provide, under the auspices of the Anglican Church, a preparatory school for boys, which will provide a liberal education in accordance with Christian values and principles. So what is a liberal education? It is an approach to learning that empowers individuals and prepares them to deal with complexity, diversity and change. It provides students with a broad knowledge of the wider world. A liberal education helps students develop a sense of social responsibility, as well as strong and transferable, intellectual and practical skills such as communication, analytical and problem solving skills, and a demonstrated ability to apply knowledge and skills in a real-world setting. What we strive to do at Cordwalles with our curriculum is to prepare our boys to become men of significance in a modern and ever changing world. We are not bound by rigid curriculums but by a liberal curriculum that gives our boys a worldly education. I believe that a liberal education in the twenty first Century is a necessity for all students and not just an option for the fortunate. As Malala Yousafzai said "One child, one teacher, one book and one pen can change the world." Education is the only solution and as WEB Du Bois said in 1949, "Of all the civil rights for which the world has struggled and fought for 5000 years, the right to learn is undoubtedly the most fundamental."

We need to raise children for the new South Africa, a child without the baggage of our generations, with little interest in money and material things, with no prejudice regarding race, religion or social standing.

I would like to thank the Cordwalles parents for their invaluable support of our school and our boys. As the Headmaster of the school one works closely with the Board and the parent committees. I would like to thank the members of all the various committees who have given unselfishly of their time and for all the many hours of hard work over the year.



Thank you to John Campbell, Chairman of the Board, for the invaluable advice and support over the last year. I would like to thank my family, Belinda, Jemma and Matt for all their support. Belinda, I really appreciate your support of me. I couldn't have done this without you. To my PA, Lynn Clark, thank you for your dedication, efficient hard work and your enormous support.

To end off I want to touch on our theme for the year, which was "Soar to New Heights". Our boys were encouraged to be the

best that they could be. Just like in the story, "Fly, Eagle, Fly" where we are reminded that we are not bound to this earth with a humdrum existence but are made with the potential to be something truly glorious. We are not mere chickens but eagles destined to soar to greater heights.

So for all of us parents and teachers sitting here today, I would like to draw on the words of Joanne Madgwick a parenting consultant. She said:

A nest keeping everyone safe within the protective boundary of love and acceptance. Then one no longer needs to keep striving, trying, pulling, instead one can soar high upon the wings of creativity, free from a lifetime of bondage to this wearisome toil. Knowing for this season all are protected and safe within the boundaries of the nest. We can also rest assured that from this season, fledglings won't be crushed and maimed but instead fed to flourish so that they too can soar."

There are a couple of gentleman here, who enjoyed a Cordwalles education ending more than 60 years, in some cases seventy years ago. Thank you for always being part of this special day. Grade 7s we hope to see you here in 70 years time.

We appreciate you taking the time out to attend our speech day and witness first hand the talent that is heading for your schools next year. This is the largest Grade 7 year ever at Cordwalles with 63 boys leaving today. There are number of us here today, including myself, who are feeling overwhelmed at the thought of our boys leaving this incredible school. Cordwalles has engaged us in a farewell experience that will be fondly remembered for the duration of both our parents' and boys' lives. Our leavers' dinner was a celebration of memories both humourous and meaningful, but more than that a demonstration of what a Cordwalles education produces.

On the Saturday morning we enjoyed a chapel service where Richard Kinvig handed out the Old Boys ties and shared the significance of these ties and how they must always be a reminder of the role Cordwalles played in your success in the future. This was followed by a dads and lads cricket game which not only reminded the dads that its far easier said than done, but also that age is taking its toll. On behalf of the Grade 7 parents I express our sincere gratitude to the staff of Cordwalles for the impact that you have had on the lives of our boys.

Today is an opportunity to reflect on the year that has passed and a celebration of success and achievement. Congratulations to all

the boys who received awards in the final assembly on Wednesday and who will be receiving awards today. To the Cordwalles leavers, well done on your achieve-

News from the Board:

This year has only seen one change to the Board and that was the retirement of Ron Nicholson, who served as the school chaplain for the past 10 years. Ron celebrated his 80th birthday just last week. Thank you Ron for your contribution to Cordwalles and the difference you made in our boys' lives.

After almost a year of construction, in February this year we celebrated the consecration of the chapel, attended by more than 400 guests from the Cordwalles community. As an Anglican school the Christian faith forms the cornerstone of our school. It was humbling to witness what this historic day meant to so many people and again a big thank you to everyone who made this possible.

Our purpose at Cordwalles is to build a boys' best foundation for life in a changing world. This starts with embedding our values and growing the culture and ethos of the school. This year the school formed a diversity committee which gave us the forum to consciously address the differences between all of us, be it race, religion, sexual orientation or marital status, and shared how we can engage more effectively with one another to ensure that Cordwalles is inclusive in every way.

Our community initiatives continue to be hugely successful, The PA, under the guidance of Rob Mitchell, continues to do a brilliant job of the Mudman. This year they raised over R350 000. Mr Gasa, the Headmaster of Ashdown Primary School, is here with us today and ever so grateful for the contribution that we make to Ashdown. Other funds from the PA went towards

improving the acoustics in the dining hall, our new electronic scoreboard and air conditioning in some of the classrooms. Thank you to all the members of the PA for your support.

Our Jackson and Sapphire scholarship programmes continue to give boys from disadvantaged backgrounds the opportunity of a privileged education at Cordwalles. Early this year Ali Kingsley, very kindly embarked on a project to contact all the Jackson Foundation boys who had been through the school. The boys reflected on what Cordwalles had meant to them. Here are some of their comments: "a unique bonding experience", "Cordwalles taught me so much about myself", "I never felt out of place." "The scholarship brought my family together and gave us hope." "There is a place for everybody at Cordwalles" "The staff were like parents to me." This is a testimony of what we achieve at Cordwalles. Well done to our Jackson and Sapphire boys.

Moving to the classroom. Our teachers have the task of opening up a new world to our children. Whether it is discovering the joy of a good book, the wonder of science, the thrill of competition or the pride in a challenge overcome. There is no task greater than preparing our children for a world yet to become a reality.

Beyond maths, reading and writing we need to teach our children problem solving, resilience, creative thinking, teamwork and the ability to adapt.

Duncan Greaves, our Head of Academics, and his team have spent the last 3 years evolving our educational programme to provide a holistic, balanced curriculum which focuses on equipping the boys with 21st century skills. The Board is confident that the academic curriculum at Cordwalles is world class and most importantly preparing our children with the skills they need for their future. On this note I express our sincere thanks to these people who do so much of the work towards our children's success. Our teachers are amazingly dedicated people and one of Cordwalles' strongest assets.

Our cultural department continues to impress, Kerry Peckham doing wonders in the art room, the drama departments production of Joseph inspired by Mrs O'Donoghue, and Mrs Blunt and her team engaging more than 40% of the boys in music. The Board has confirmed an exciting project for next year will be a renovation to the music rooms and drama area, I know Mrs Blunt has waited for this for many years. Work will begin in early 2019.

This year we saw the completion of a R5 million renovation to the boarding house. The boys have new sleeping areas, beautiful ablutions and some very well-planned social areas. Thank you to Brendan Bailey and the boarding staff, for their guidance and patience during this renovation. Our goal to become a centre for boarding excellence is well on track.

The safety of our boys and staff is of highest priority and along with increasing our security for visitors at the gate, we have installed a new electric fence around the entire back of the school and installed state-of-the-art CCTV equipment. We have no crime to report on except for boarders sneaking down fire escapes in the late hours of the night.

Cordwalles continues to excel at their sport, a medium where the

boys learn a very different sets of skills to the classroom. We are very fortunate to have a mix of experienced coaches and young enthusiastic coaches involved in our coaching. This is complimented by professional coaches, Mandy Wheeler, Darren Mortimer and Chris Folker. Thank you to Dave Evans and his team for the magnificent grounds and facilities and to Luke Hounsom and the coaching staff for all they do in the sport department. The Board has agreed to the upgrading of our cricket nets in 2019, with longer term plans of a sports centre. In summary, Cordwalles is in a good place, economic conditions are tough, and we are all feeling this at home and in business. I must compliment Lance Veenstra and his team for being agile and able to adapt to ensure that Cordwalles thrives even through adverse times. An opportunity that arose through this challenging time was the starting of a Grade RRR. In no time at all Ruth Forder had eighteen 4 year olds committed to Cordwalles for 2019. The marketing team go to great lengths to attract boys from all over Africa and although our numbers are down from the highs of two years ago, we are confident in the efforts from the school.

Thank you to Graham Evans for chairing the Cordwalles Trust under the watchful eye of Fred Palmer and guidance from Andrew Smythe. The trust was set up to help fund the out of the ordinary school expenses, which include bursaries, staff development and some capital projects and has certainly been a great help to the school.

Thank you to all our parents and guardians for not only recognizing the importance of giving your children a world class education, but for choosing to give them the opportunity to attend Cordwalles. Many parents have also chosen to get involved in the school, be it as a class mom or helping on the PA or even just supporting your kids at a sports games. We are hugely appreciative of this and so are your boys.

Thank you to our Bursar Antoinette Hankinson, for your continued diligence in making the numbers work. We really appreciate all you do for Cordwalles. Thank you to the Board and especially our committee heads Kim Peddie, Franci Leppan, James Wardlaw, Rich Kinvig and Rob Mitchell for the time and dedication they give to Cordwalles.

Last but not least, our Headmaster, Mr Veenstra I can't believe you have been at the helm for 3 years already. I know at times you have significant challenges to deal with and often feel quite isolated in your role. We are hugely grateful for your sincere enthusiasm, integrity, passion for Cordwalles and continued humble leadership.

Thank you for the invitation to share this auspicious occasion with you.

It is wonderful being back at this special school which has a real hold on my heart. My husband, Alan and I spent so many good times watching sport, plays, cook offs, go karts, market days, musical concerts, prize-givings and we were stalwart supporters of the legendary 100 Club. Not to mention Mudman as Alan conceived the idea as a fundraiser for Cordies and he worked tirelessly with Ruth Forder and others in getting it going.

So much so, that when a young athletic-looking boy, Murray Starr, walked into my Grade 8 class at Maritzburg College, he gave me a big smile when he realised that I was his English teacher and announced triumphantly, 'I know you! You're Mrs Mudman!' And indeed I am.

Today I'm going to focus on you boys and share some thoughts and hope that you will remember some of these handy hints for life!

Cordwalles is a school I admire enormously as it really focuses on the holistic approach of what is best for you boys. While the benefits of excellent staff, top facilities and beautiful grounds are obvious, a subtler aspect is the hidden curriculum of learning sound life-long values and enduring friendships.

An example of these enduring Cordies' friendships which has intrigued me is that when our sons, Tom and James, return from the Cape during the holidays, they always meet up with a group of past Cordies boys, with the WhatsApp group the Burra Boys and they go to the Thistle Hotel for a curry and plan some golf.

A touching moment as a mother was when they invited the moms on the one occasion and we had a great meal with the young men - and I don't think it was only so we'd pay!

What is important about this group, and no doubt other similar ones, is that these young men were in various grades at Cordies spanning four years and they had attended different high schools and universities, but that Cordies bond is there and they still look out for one another.

The Cordies' brotherhood is real and is an aspect you must safeguard. I hope that many of you boys in this marquee may keep in touch and enjoy your bond throughout your lives – so please make the effort with old Cordies' friends

I spent nearly twenty very happy years at Maritzburg College. As a teacher, I loved the energy, humour and camaraderie of the

boys, and when each matric class left, I held my breath and prayed for their safety as risk taking and living on the edge awaiting the next adven-

ture, seemed part of being boyish.



So often when a boy was sent to me for some misdemeanour, his opening words were, "I didn't think that..." and you know, the truth is, he probably didn't. Thinking of consequence is not something which comes readily to young men, and as friends, you need to guard one another to think for 30 seconds before you decide to do something edgy. It's referred to as 30 Seconds of Madness and is responsible for so many poor choices.

Parents, one of the most important things you can teach an adolescent boy is consequences – it could just save his life. I know as mothers, we tend to view our children through rosetinted glasses – but to any mother who says that they know that their son would never do a particular deed and that he would definitely be honest with his mother, I need to say, 'oh yes'?

There's a good reason for the impulsive behaviour which boys are more prone to, and that is because the frontal lobe in males takes longer to close – only when you're about 25. Michael Gurian was one of my gurus when I was teaching boys, and his story about Charlie illustrates the 'I didn't think that..." behaviour very well...

"When we were 13, my friends and I had this game. We'd go down to the basement where it was completely dark, and each of us would find a hiding place. Then someone would start the game by turning out the lights, and we'd try to hit each other with darts. You'd think you heard someone make a noise, and you'd come out of your hiding place throwing darts – but cringing because you were fair game too. There would be complete silence, and then you'd hear someone yell "OW!" One time we turned on the light and a guy had a dart dangling from his cheek just below his eye."

For you young men, the world awaits, and you will find that you are exceptionally well prepared for high school. You have learnt so much without sometimes realising it: such as: crucial people skills, time management, how to be a team player, winning and losing, and your foundation for academics has been laid firmly. From my experience of teaching boys, the stereotype of the Cordwalles boy was a gentleman who became involved in numerous areas, and was a loyal friend to others.

With your superb head start, it is expected of you that you give of your best with enthusiasm and that the lives of others around you

are improved because you have the skills to make people feel more than in your company. With privilege comes responsibility to lead a life of significance.

All of you young men sitting here aim to be successful at high school and as adults, don't you? How will you measure your success one day? I urge you that rather than aiming for success, you aim to lead a life of significance. So what is the difference between success and significance?

Scoring a century, playing the lead in the play and making piles of cash, might make you successful but they won't necessarily make you significant – they do not change the world or make it better in the long term. In the whole scheme of things, they are insignificant.

Joe Ehrman says, "All of us have a responsibility to give back, to make the world fairer, more just, more hospitable for every human being." Success focuses on one's own ambition, desires and sometimes ego, while significance focuses on the positive impact one has on other people. So how do you start leading a life of significance? I would suggest by walking the path of being a good man.

Unfortunately, our society has not always given a healthy view of masculinity and in the past, outdated ideas were heard, such as 'boys don't cry', men must be the breadwinners, and a ripped 6-pack is essential. Myths about masculinity have centred around the importance of being athletic, earning lots of money, wielding power in the board room, and of being a slayer. However, these are myths and will in themselves not lead to happiness, nor to being a good man. Being a good man is so much more than that.

Men have as great a variety of emotions as women do, and need the freedom to express these emotions if they are to be well adjusted and happy.

Fundamental to being a good man is the ability to love and be loved in return and the best place to start with this is within one's family. A good man values his family. So treasure yours and let's start by thanking them for the opportunity of a Cordies' education

Research has shown that the most admired quality in good men is kindness. Far from being a soft characteristic, it is the one that defines a person who makes a difference. Learning to love, to be loved and to show kindness are the glue of relationships and for you to lead significant lives as good men, your relationships are key.

According to research, other noble qualities of good men are courage, integrity and determination, or grit. These are traits which others admire and to which you young men of Cordwalles have certainly been exposed. Your school motto of 'Courage builds Character' reinforces this.

As schools, we need to reflect on whether we have created adults of quality and this is difficult to measure now as we can really only judge in a decade or two when you young men become life partners, start working, and perhaps become fathers.

Keith Richardson, past Head of Wynberg Boys', comments in his book, 'Before the wax melts', on the document put out by the New Zealand Rugby Board after they had instigated an enquiry as to why the All Blacks' performance had disappointed in the World Cup in 2007. I paraphrase and quote from Keith's book:

The 44-page report could be summed up in these words:

'A better person makes a better All Black. No mention of results or World Cup trophies. The emphasis was on what makes a better human being – a significant one. The report provided guidelines on: how to treat team mates, the opposition, spectators, the bus driver, and the importance of leaving a change room spotless. The result? A long term winning streak and two consecutive World Cup trophies...'

This philosophy is epitomised by the action of Sonny Bill Williams after an excited boy ran onto the field after the 2015 World Cup Final and was tackled by an overly zealous security guard.

Williams accompanied the young boy back to his mother and gave the boy his gold medal. 'That is class. That is a quality human being. My Jewish friends would say THAT is a MENSCH. I have known so many quality teachers in my time who understand that their rewards come years later. They see beyond the temporary euphoria of a sporting win, an Eisteddfod Gold or an A aggregate in Matric. They realise that their true role in life is to produce a mensch.' So go on each one of you, stand tall as a significant young man, a mensch.

In your years at high school, try to maximise your experience by making friends with people from diverse backgrounds, read (even of you don't like that much – try harder!) and be curious, find out more about your own spiritual needs, get involved at school, work hard, and enjoy yourself.

Imagine that Cordwalles is a high diving board and it's up to you how enthusiastically you propel yourself into high school. Opportunity awaits so back yourself and leap forward as you embrace the challenge.

As you go on your way remember:

To keep in touch with your old Cordies friends

Think for 30 seconds before doing something risky

Seek significance rather than success

Value your family

Show love and kindness

Seek spiritual peace

and may God bless you and hold you in the palm of His hand.





The Choir won three Gold Medals and were crowned World Champions at the 2014 World Choir Games in Latvia, the largest choir competition in the world. Kearsney is the second-most decorated choir in the history of the World Choir Games, with 13 Gold Medals and 6 Silver Medals.

Presentations were given on the latest trends as well as problems and solutions faced by boarding schools. Much focus was placed on the dangers of social media and the importance of schools (and parents) monitoring what boys are getting up to on these platforms. While social media seems very important to the present school going generation, it was again highlighted how getting to know people face to face was a far more valuable skill. An over reliance on social media could result in the vital ability to build a relationship being lost. Social media really should not be available to boys in their bedrooms at night or in an unlimited manner.

Dr Rob Pluke again met with boys and staff during the course of the year. His interventions, together with our ongoing Big Brother and Big Sister programme, remains a very important part of the pastoral care offered to boarders at Cordwalles. It is a concern to me that boys seem to instinctively buy into the 'Code of Silence'. This is such a dangerous attitude and one that has caused a great deal of harm to countless individuals in many institutions over the years. Cordwalles has a blame free approach to hurtful behaviour and boys are encouraged to seek help from an adult they trust immediately they feel threatened in any way.

Sisters Sue Warr and Linda Mapham dealt with broken ankles and wrists, many scrapes and bruises and long lasting coughs this year. While this is obviously an important part of their jobs, their ability to hug, love and listen is even more important and they are thanked for their amazing patience and kindness.

Xolisile Nzimande, Winnie Mlawo and Fikile Ngcobo do a great deal to make sure that the boarding house is clean and tidy at all times. While certainly not part of their responsibility, they are often found remaking beds, folding clothes and packing various items for our boys. Their contribution is huge and I sincerely hope that it is appreciated by the boys. Winnie Mlawo retired in December after 21 years of loyal service. We thank her and wish her well for the years ahead.

In her address at Speech Day, Debbie Martin mentioned the All Blacks attitude of better people making better All Blacks. We have been trying to implement a very similar approach in the Cordwalles Boarding House for several years now. We have achieved a great deal of success with the boarding staff and some success with the boys. One aspect that remains

problematic is that the All Blacks always leave a room in a better state than they found it. The coach, captain and team leaders set the example and take a major role in sweeping, picking up litter and cleaning. This ability to clean up behind them remains a work in progress for Cordwalles boarders. While some may say that 'boys will be boys', I think that in line with our value of RESPECT, it is not impossible to get Cordwalles boys to pick up and tidy up any mess they have made.

Our boarder masters and interns contribute a great deal in many areas in the boarding house. A sincere thanks to all for your time, efforts and care. We bid farewell to Travis Clark, Nick Cumings, Ross Hudson, Michael Dedekind and Ariksha Lalbeharee at the end of this year and wish them well on their next adventure.

Michael Campbell, Ruth Forder and Antoinette Hankinson all play a vital role in the successful running of the boarding house and they are thanked for their tireless efforts.

We wish all the Grade 7 leavers the best as they head off to their respective high schools. We look forward to hearing of their successes in the years to come. Thabelo Letjama is congratulated on being awarded the Gayle Bastard trophy for Boarder of the Year for 2018.

Tracy Bell to take his place as school chaplain. Tracy is the parish priest of St David's Church in Prestbury and has been involved for many years in spiritual guidance at St Nicholas Diocesan School. She is also involved with Safe Church work at both Diocesan and ACSA levels. At a service held in our beautiful chapel, the Bishop inducted Tracy as the chaplain of Cordwalles and she quickly slipped into her new role. The boys enjoy her relaxed approach and informality of her services. We welcome Tracy and hope that she will share many happy years with us.





The consecration of the extensions to the Cordwalles chapel on 9 February 2018

On Friday morning of 9 February, the Cordwalles community gathered together to open and consecrate the magnificent work that had been done to extend and improve the chapel at the school. Bishop Dino officiated and blessed the new building.

It was an enormous honour for me to be invited back to Cordwalles for this significant occasion in the school's history. It was truly gratifying to see a dream become a reality and the outcome of these additions to this building are truly magnificent.

When I was a boy at this school, the chapel was a place I would often come to for quiet contemplation and prayer. This special place has played a meaningful role in my life starting from when I was boy here through to when I was a boarder master and it was my anchor in my time here as the Headmaster. John Steere, who taught here for over 30 years always proudly told us boys that this was the only building in the area that did not have any cracks in it on this very clay based hill above Pietermaritzburg. He said it was as if God had protected it from nature.

It would seem appropriate to reflect on the history of the chapel and how we arrived at this memorable occasion. The Christopher family, in memory of their son John who died of leukaemia, originally donated the money for this chapel on 28 May 1930. The chapel was built and then consecrated in March 1932. Mr and Mrs Christopher's enormous faith and love of God is portrayed in them saying "We have lost our son, but even in this God is Glorified." The Latin words "Ad Majorem Dei", appear on the tablet that they installed in the chapel after it was built. This means "To the greater Glory of God".

On this beautiful bronze tablet is a picture of a runner handing over a baton to another runner. The inscription on the tablet reads "The chapel was built by the parents of John Christopher of Selborne Ladysmith in loving memory of their son, a boy of this school, and in the hope that succeeding generations of boys may in worship here gain inspiration of service and sacrifice.' It ends with the Latin word "Vitai Lampada Tradunt", which means "They pass the torch of light."

This has a wonderful message for all at Cordwalles. As the Cordwalles community, we are responsible for passing on the torch of light from one generation to the next. We need to ensure that God is glorified in this place.

In the generation before us, Ronald Brooks the third Headmaster, found the chapel rather dingy and depressing. He dreamed of transforming the chapel and that is what he was able to achieve. He was instrumental in beautifying this place of worship by installing the two stained glass windows of St George and St Michael, the tester, the candlesticks, the cross and the arras. All of this was done for the improvement of worship.

It was our turn to pass the torch of light on to the next generation by enlarging the chapel as the school had grown enormously. When I arrived at Cordwalles as the 6th Headmaster in 2004, there were 240 boys at the school and we were able to cope with the chapel size as we split the times of chapel for the Junior Primary and the Senior Primary. However, the numbers grew to 370 and this meant that there was no space in our small chapel



to house the increased numbers. We squeezed boys into every nook and cranny until eventually it became untenable to continue. We knew something had to be done. The dream of enlarging the chapel was thus born and we worked with Nick Grice to develop a plan to increase the chapel from seating 150 to seating over 300. It was an ambitious plan and dream and yet, through the very kind donations of many, we have been able to make this dream a reality. The renovated and enlarged chapel now serves as our generation's legacy as we hand the baton on to those who come after us.

However, the handing over of the torch should not only be in what we build with bricks and mortar. The Christophers made it clear that we should be handing on the torch of worship and Christian inspiration so that the boys who pass through this school may dedicate their lives to sacrifice and service. Our real challenge as a community is to ensure that this continues and strengthens into the future.

We, all forming part of the Cordwalles community, need to ensure that we encourage a love and reverence of God in this place where there is a dignity and beauty in the worship that takes place in this sacred space. We also need to inspire our boys to search for a deep and abiding faith and at the same time instil in them a tolerance and understanding of difference. As Cordwalles is a boy's foundation for life, it is the chapel that is and should be at the centre of that foundation. The chapel and the worship that takes place in it is the heart and centre of the school. With the renovation and extension of this building, the Cordwalles community can be very proud of its heart and soul.

I would like to take this opportunity of congratulating everyone who has contributed in making this dream a reality. It was a great privilege and honour to be a part of the opening ceremony and I wish all in the Cordwalles community blessings in abundance and many hours of meaningful prayer and worship in this special place.





Senior Chess

Chess is a sport for champion minds. This year we sadly had very few boys playing due to the time slot available. We did however make the best of this time and enjoyed some well-played games.

I don't think many people realize just how much chess benefits a child or an adult, so I thought we could highlight some key points that have been researched. Chess can raise your IQ within as little as four months of starting and playing it consistently on a weekly basis. The brain works like a muscle and chess has the potential to prevent Alzheimer's disease in elderly people. Chess exercises both sides of your brain, and creates opportunities to see solutions to problems in logical and creative ways. Chess can help increase memory retention and the ability to adapt to changing situations much faster. It increases problem solving skills and for some reason also increases reading skills. It helps with concentration. It really helps with planning and foresight. The most amazing thing chess can do for a person is that it can help a person grow dendrites. "Dendrites are the tree-like branches that conduct signals from other neural cells into the neurons they are attached to. Think of them like antennas picking up signals from other brain cells. The more antennas you have and the bigger they are; the more signals you'll pick up. Learning a new skill like chess-playing causes dendrites to grow. But that growth doesn't stop once you've learned the game; interaction with people in challenging activities also fuels dendrite growth." With all of that in mind you can see why we think that chess is such a powerful and fun sport for our boys to play. Johnathan Baber from Butchers managed to clinch the win for the Interhouse Senior Chess championship. The Chess trophy for best player of the year went to Connor Sawyer who stayed ahead of the pack for the year in his matches. It was nice to also see

boys teaching each other attack and defensive moves during the year. Chess is a sport where we can all learn from each other! I look forward to the fierce battles in store next year with all the talented Cordies boys.

Along with their new found friends, they spent part of the morning at the Outdoor Classroom, playing a variety of Literacy and Numeracy games and enjoying the forest on the school's grounds. The Grade 2 teachers from Ashdown then took the various games back to their school to continue using these in their classrooms, sharing them with other staff and children at Ashdown. Each boy packed an extra snack to share with a child from Ashdown. Much fun was had by all.





The Grade 3 boys collected a sum of R3000,00 towards stationery for the Ashdown Grade 3 teachers for 2019. These items were delivered to Ashdown by the grade. Whilst we were there, each boy taught a group of Ashdown children how to make a candle holder using the base of a used milk bottle. This was interesting to observe; what a hive of noise and activity! Thanks to the response to our request for milk bottles and to Mrs Peckham's guidelines, the boys, with varying degrees of authority, set about tasking their 'pupils.' The end results were testimony to the effective teamwork and camaraderie; the day was fun and successful.



Grade 4 went to Ashdown, ready to inspire the 200 Grade 4 children. Our boys taught them our rap song:

- · Reduce, Reuse, Recycle
- Clean our land
- · Lend a hand
- · Trash for cash
- · Bring your stash

One of the Cordwalles 'teacher' Grade 4 boys taught Ashdown students how to make a heart from recycled paper pulp and mounted them on board, which would become a plaque to remind them to recycle. Ashdown will be supplying Central Waste with trash and earning cash which they will be able to buy different balls for the children to play with at break times.

In the first term the Grade 6s collected pet food which was distributed to the Howick SPCA. The response was excellent and the boys were thanked for their generosity.



Visual Arts

The Art Department at Cordwalles strives to create a safe environment where each boy has the opportunity to express his creative ideas and a mutual respect is given. It is a happy place where boys are encouraged to engage fully in the process of art making and learn a variety of skills that will enable them to express themselves independently.

Problem solving is going to be a key attribute which will be sought after in the market place in the future. Using environmental or land art as a spring board this year, the boys looked at the work of Andy Goldsworthy and where challenged to try it out.

The Grade 4s studied spiders and made sculptures out of polystyrene, their challenge was to make a realistic web that could catch giant flies with a ball of string. This was an excellent problem for the team of 4 spinners to solve.

It was clear that the teams who pooled their ideas were more successful. The teams that could also communicate their ideas clearly also found the task easier. It was interesting to watch the teams spinning their webs between the trees in the forest, and overcoming the challenge of how to tie knots and weave a web that could catch giant flies.



The Grade 5 boys looked at design and cartoons. They created a bird that could be used as an app image and then carved it out of polystyrene and had fun decorating their characters. The problem they had to solve from natural resources found in the forest was to build a nest for their bird. The nest had to provide shelter for the egg and warmth for the chick.

Again it was an excellent opportunity to see the boys use creative thinking skills to solve the problem, using only natural resources. Environmental art's aim is to bring boys into an awareness of their environment without using man-made materials to create art works. Everything must be biodegradable.

On the 8th of May an excited group of Grade 6 boys headed off to Ardmore Ceramic Studio in the Midlands.

Their task was to look for ideas for a container that they could make in the style of the Ardmore artists who draw a lot of inspiration from the animals and plants around them. The boys were amazed at the detail that these artists use in their sculpture to capture so realistically the world around them.

It was fascinating to observe how each sculpture is created by a group of artists, starting from the sculpture, then the wheel thrower, to the hands that fire it, paint it and finally glaze it. No wonder they adopt the creed: We are because of others.

The Tatham Gallery was a wonderful spring board for discussion as the boys in Grade 7 viewed the Matric Art Exhibition which show cased work from various schools around the city. The boys saw how, through many different mediums, art can be used to give a message.

The boys in Grade 3, 4 and 5 visited Ashdown equipped with bags of trash to turn into treasure. Art is a wonderful vehicle to bridge many chasms. The Grade 3s collected over 300 milk bottles from which they made water lillies. They used this activity to inspire the children to recycle and bring plastic to school. The Grade 5s sang their recycling song and used coke bottles to demonstrate how to make flowers which bought great pleasure to the Ashdown children. The Grade 4s took buckets of paper pulp with which they had to make hearts with the Grade 4 children to show their love for the environment and to pledge to



recycle. Not only did these projects help our boys to consolidate what they had learnt by teaching others, but it also encouraged Ashdown to take the opportunity to recycle and turn trash to cash, with Central Waste coming on board. The Grade 4s had made up a song which goes like this: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Clean our land, Lend a hand, Cash for trash, Bring your stash.

Art is an invaluable subject in which our Cordwalles boys are equipped with creativity, problem solving skills and the lenses to see the world differently.

Cordwalles Arbor Day took place on the first weekend of Term 4. This year we planted 240 trees spanning 26 different species, all of which are indigenous not only to South Africa, but specifically to the Pietermaritzburg area. Eight of those species have also not been planted at all under the Arbor Day programme for at least the last 3 years!

The boys certainly enjoyed planting the trees, and although many required some assistance, they mostly did a very good job of ensuring that in true Cordwalles spirit, the trees received their own best "Foundation for Life".

Indigenous Nursery (owned by Cordwalles old boy Andrew James) once again supplied us with a fabulous array of fine trees and we eagerly await their growth and development on the slope looking out towards Clarendon. If you haven't done so before, do yourself a favour and take a walk down to the Outdoor Class-

room to see what a magnificent piece of land the boys are privileged to experience. With your help and support, our forest really is growing into a treasure within the city limits.

The upside of so many indigenous trees is the return of the birdlife to this area. From small frugivorous species, to insectivores and even a wide range of raptors, one can spend hours simply watching and listening to the birds doing their thing.







Grade 6 UK Exchange

As many of you may know, every year several Grade 6 Cordwalles boys are very fortunate to enjoy the incredible experience of being part of the UK Exchange programme with St Piran's School in Maidenhead, England. Three St Piran's boys visited Cordwalles in February of this year and on the 26th April I was privileged to be the teacher who accompanied the four Cordies boys as they flew to London to start their part of the exchange. With all the regulations and requirements involved when accompanying minors overseas, we endured a few anxious moments as all the documentation was carefully scrutinized by the authorities at the airport. Fortunately, Lynn Clark was as efficient as ever and her scrupulous attention to detail meant that no problems were encountered. However, Jarred Maltby learnt the hard and somewhat embarrassing lesson that a 500ml bottle of mouthwash was an unwelcome guest in his hand luggage!

After a delayed departure in both Durban and Johannesburg, we finally took off and settled in for our long flight to London. It was an absolute pleasure being chaperone to the four Cordies boys who were a credit to Cordwalles and themselves, behaving impeccably as is expected of true young Cordwalles gentlemen. On arrival in London we discovered that Riley's luggage was missing – clearly the fault of a person in a hurry who had taken Riley's suitcase in error, only to leave his own standing forlornly next to the baggage carousel! The excited host families met us at the airport and spirited the boys away to begin their adventure. I collected my hire car and then set off through the somewhat terrifying London traffic – I only got hooted at a couple of times – to spend the weekend with friends in the beautiful Cotswolds. Thank goodness for Google Maps – bless the person who invented that!!

As the accompanying teacher on an exchange trip, one is tasked with visiting UK schools to learn how they do things over there, to garner ideas and to see how what we do at Cordwalles compares with schools in the London area. My task was to look at school libraries. I visited a total of six private schools in Oxford, Shaftesbury, Haslemere and Poole, which is down in the beautiful county of Dorset. I also visited one government school called Cordwalles Junior School in Camberley just outside London. From these visits, it was obvious that reading was a priority in all schools. However, only one school - Dragon School in Oxford - had a library that compared in any way to the beautiful, bright, spacious space we are so lucky to occupy at Cordwalles. Two of the school's libraries doubled up as classrooms, one school did not have a library to speak of - just two rooms used for storage of the books; only one school had a full time librarian; one school had a lovely library space with a good selection of books, but no librarian at all - a librarian was starting in September, and one school shared their librarian with another school.

I believe that a library should not only be a source of a wide

variety of interesting and stimulating fiction and non-fiction reading material for the boys, but that it is also an information centre and a place where the boys can extend their general knowledge and knowledge of current affairs and the world around them by way of interesting and informative displays. I also believe that the library should be a haven for those boys who do not enjoy the rough and tumble of physical games at break times, a place where they can read quietly, build puzzles or play board games. None of the libraries that I visited were structured along these lines, probably as a result of there not being a dedicated, full-time person to run the library. What I took away from the visits to the schools in the UK, was that we are very fortunate at Cordwalles to have a large, modern, multi-purpose space in which our library is housed and a supportive management who willingly grants me a generous budget to buy new books and decorate the space.

In between visits to the various schools, I managed to visit friends and family and spend some special quality time catching up with them! We were fortunate to enjoy some very pleasant, hot and sunny spring weather, so much so that on the Saturday of the Bank Holiday long weekend there were 100 000 people on the beaches of Bournemouth and I came back with a tan! The boys were thoroughly spoilt by their host families and enjoyed a myriad of exciting experiences during their stay. What an unforgettable two and a half weeks for us all! All too soon we met up again at Heathrow on the 13th May. Four very happy boys, so much richer for their experiences, said fond farewells to their host families and boarded the plane, sad to leave, but ready to go home; bursting with stories to share with their parents who were eagerly awaiting their arrival in Durban. Thank you Cordwalles for this incredible opportunity!



School Council


School Council



Grade 4 Environmental Trip to Spirit of Adventure


The Grade 4 boys went to Spirit of Adventure at Shongweni Dam. A reflection from one of the Grade 4 boys who went to Spirit of Adventure:

On the sporting front, the Grade 3s coped exceptionally well with their busy year of U9 sport and the Grade 1s and 2s with their practices and festivals.







A wonderful display of power hitting from Onke Kweyama (70* from 52 balls) saw us record a comfortable 7 wicket win. This win showed how far this team had come from the beginning of the year and I was unbelievably proud of their achievements.

Cricket at Cordwalles is in a healthy state and this is in large part due to the fantastic group of coaches that we have. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for all their efforts throughout the year and cricket is in a better place because of them. Thanks must also be extended to Mr Darren Mortimer for all his efforts with the one on one coaching that he and his team do. Our boys really have benefitted from this. To Mr Evans and his unbelievable ground staff, thank you for the fantastic facilities that our boys are privileged play on week in and week out.


THE SCHOOL BIRTHDAY


2018 arrived and Cordwalles turned 106 on 7th February. This year there was much to celebrate in the official opening of the new extensions to the chapel, so central to life at Cordwalles. Built in 1932 by kind donation of the Christopher family in memory of a lost son and Cordies boy, John, the chapel has been at the heart of the school ever since. With the expansion of the school over the years, the chapel could no longer hold all the boys, staff and parents and, as part of the on-going centenary celebrations, plans were put in place for new extensions. With the enormous contribution of subsequent generations of the Christopher family, old boys, friends and parents, that vision came to be at the end of 2017. Bishop Dino Gabriel, Anglican Bishop of Natal officiated together with Cordwalles Chaplain, Ron Nicholson. Under the watchful eve of the boys, staff, parents, old boys and friends, the chapel was re-consecrated and was once again back at the heart of the school.

Many parents and old boys, both singularly or collectively, had sponsored pews for the chapel. This project took the form of sponsoring a family pew, or a particular sports team (i.e. lst XV 1986), a class pew or a pew for an individual. The pews look fantastic in their new setting and will be a reminder for many years to come of the boys who have passed through the gates and through the doors of the chapel over the many years. 


