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
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What 2021 taught us is that grit and determination are intrinsically woven into the fabric of what makes Cordwalles so special and unique.

I would like to make special mention of the number of workshops, training and staff developments that our staff have been on this year. Upskilling and developing our staff is a very important part of our strategy.

My job as headmaster is to report back on the past year and I realize that this can be quite dry and a little boring, especially for you younger boys sitting here. I want all you gentlemen sitting in front of me to think back and reflect on your year. I want you to think about some of the triumphs you may have had this year, no matter how big or small. The boys coming up to receive certificates today will be celebrating their achievements, and this is excellent. Many of you won't receive an award, but this doesn't mean you haven't had success in some form. You have all faced challenges this year. You have all had to climb your own mountains. Well done!

2021 was a year to remember in more ways than one. 2021, for me, will be remembered as a year we all tried to be the best that we could be. We often talk about excellence at Cordwalles, and I believe that many of our boys certainly did excel in different aspects of school life. Our Grade 7 boys of 2021 did not disappoint in terms of the number of scholarships they were able to win to high schools of their choice. 10 boys received scholarships. Well done boys! On a significant note, 19 of our Old Boys going into Grade 12 next year have been appointed into leadership positions in their respective schools.

We have once again done exceptionally well on the sports field with our boys punching well above their weight against much bigger schools. Highlights this year were the success of our swimming, cricket, rugby and hockey teams, who beat most of our local competition.

Special mention on the sports front must be made of Jack Benkenstein, the 1st XI captain, who broke the school batting record, amassing 210 runs against Clifton NR. He beat the previous record set by William Dixon-Smith who scored 209 against Highbury in 1958. David Steyn also needs special mention for his feats in the swimming pool and on the athletics track, where he broke seven records this year. Other highlights would be our open rugby sides winning all their matches against St Charles by over 40 points per game. Returning to school after Lockdown, seeing all our boys actively involved in sports games and being able to go on class outings and tours, makes us all very excited.



Our choir was able to gather and practise as the Covid-19 restrictions were eased and was able to sing at our carol service this year. The Grade Rs, 3s and 7s put on their annual productions in front of live audiences. The highlight being the Grade 7 show "Vaudeville." The other grades performed in front of virtual audiences.

Art and Design and Technology classes are now taking place in our brand new, state-of-the-art creative space. This facility, designed by Nick Grice, our school architect, will be officially opened early next year on our 110-year birthday celebrations. This is certainly an exciting and beautiful space for all Cordwalles boys to enjoy for many years to come.

My greatest debt of gratitude goes to our amazing Cordwalles staff, without whom this school would not exist. Teachers are the life blood of a school. I am constantly at a loss to convey to people what the Cordwalles staff are and do. Our staff put an enormous amount of enthusiasm, patience and time into moulding our boys to become better young gentleman, better scholars, better cultural artists and better sportsmen. Cordwalles staff are not just here to pass on received information. Good teachers do that. What great teachers do is mentor, provoke and engage, because education is about learning. The staff have served your sons well beyond the call of duty in these difficult and challenging times. This committed group of people are led by an experienced and forward looking management team. It is this team that is always questioning, guiding, pushing boundaries and testing new ideas to make sure we stay relevant and at the cutting edge. I would like to thank Duncan Greaves for his input and sound advice he adds to this, the engine room of the school. It is not just the academic staff that make Cordwalles what it is. I would also like to thank the support staff, the administration staff, boarding staff and the kitchen staff for their huge contribution. I am, and you ought to be, very grateful to all these people. Please let's show them our appreciation for all they do, particularly over the past testing and demanding year.

This is always a sad time of the year as we have to bid farewell to a number of staff members. Mrs Forder retires after 16 years of sterling service. There are no words big enough to convey the thanks that Cordwalles feels towards her. Thank you Ruth for going well beyond the call of duty to help make Cordies the great school it is today. You are efficient, dedicated, passionate and have instilled the importance of relationships. Thank you for guiding and looking after all of us

and always having lots of fun on the way. We wish you and Mike all the best for your retirement and many happy years touring the country and visiting Kyle and Georgie and Ross. Mrs Forder will be replaced by Mrs Kerry Koller who many of you will know.

Another sad goodbye is to our Head of Boarding. Mr Bailey has been appointed headmaster of Riverview Prepatory School in Malelane. Mr Bailey is an exceptional teacher, housemaster and deputy head who has shaped many a young boy's life in the classroom, on the sports fields and in the boarding house. Brendan oversaw the renovation of the boarding house in 2018. It is now a world class boarding facility and a number of his suggestions were incorporated into the renovations. He was also part of a dynamic marketing team that has seen the numbers in the boarding house increase from 35 boys to the 85 boys we have this year. Brendan, thank you for your friendship and loyal support as one of my deputies. We wish you, Janet, Jess and Kerry all the best. A point of interest is that in the last 12 years, eight members of staff at Cordwalles have gone on to become heads of other schools. Not only do we grow and nurture young boys to become men of significance, but just as importantly, we also grow and develop our staff. Mr Bailey will be replaced in the classroom by Mrs Lee-Ann Chapman, who will be returning to us from The Wykeham Collegiate. Mr de Jager joins the management team as the new Housemaster and Mr Robertson takes over Mr de Jager's responsibilities as the head of pupil affairs for Grades 6 and 7.

Mr Drewett, who has been an intern at Cordwalles for the past two years and who is now qualified, will teach the additional Grade 5 class, due to the increase in numbers in that grade. It is exciting to be able to offer internal promotion opportunities to our staff.

We are also sad to bid farewell to Ms Neliswa Khumalo, our Head of the Academic Support Unit, as she is moving up to St Stithian's in Johannesburg. Thank you Neliswa for the skill and expertise you brought to our Academic Support Unit. You have certainly raised the bar in a short space of time and have placed our academic support programme on another level. We wish you and Hlelo all the best in your move back to Johannesburg. Ms Khumalo has been replaced by Mrs Dakers.

Mrs Kirsten Greaves has been a Grade 4 teacher at Cordwalles for the past 4 years. She has been involved in many facets of the school. A class teacher, a sports coach and a person with a huge heart for outreach. Kirsten has been our liaison with Ashdown Primary and has initiated and run the Saturday school programme, Bambinsani for our support staff's children. This programme takes place on a Saturday morning and was designed to help these children catch up on school work that they have lost, due to the fact that most of them are still not back at school full time. Our academic staff and interns help out on a rotational basis. We were very excited this year when one of our ground staff's nephew was awarded a Jackson Foundation Scholarship to attend Cordwalles next year. Kirsten, although we are sad to see you leave the classroom, we are relieved that we will still see you around as a mum and a wife. Thank you for your contributions. Mrs Greaves will be replaced by Mrs Hoatson, who is no stranger to us and we welcome her as a permanent member of our staff. Mrs Hoatson's position in Grade RR has been filled by Mrs Purchase and because of an increase in numbers in Grade RR next year we are opening up a second class and this class will be taught by Ms Mashinini.

We also say farewell to a number of interns and boarder masters. Miss Sandi Ncgobo, Mr Campbell Farr, Mr Cyril Mthimkulu and Mr Alex Bartlett our Gap student from the United Kingdom. Thank you all for your time and service.

Mrs Kim Mitchell has been our Occupational Therapist for the last 2 years. Kim, your involvement in the Academic Support Unit has been invaluable. We hope you get to spend more time with your young family. Thank you. Kim's place has been filled by Ms Liz Lee and we look forward to having her as part of the Support Unit.

Replacing a leaving teacher takes hours and hours of interviews and watching prospective applicants teach a lesson. We are in a very fortunate position that we get hundreds of applications for each post advertised.

I heard a very wise lady speak yesterday, which made my heart very warm. She said, once you have taught at Cordwalles, you will always be part of the Cordwalles family and I hope the staff leaving this year, will feel the same way.

Welcome to the Bishop of Natal, Bishop Nkosinathi Ndwandwe. Thank you for taking the time out of your busy schedule to be with us today. Our new Board members and their spouses. Ray Mhkulisi and Charmaine Padyachee, welcome and thank you for joining us today. Ray, I was wondering, this must be your first day sitting here since you were a Grade 7 leaver? Charmaine as a parent at the school and Head of Mathematics at Hilton College, this environment is familiar to you.

The Biggs, Fowlers and Sarah Pennington, always good to see you; we missed you last year but are grateful for your support. Past headmaster, Tim Evans and past Chairman Graham Evans, thank you for joining us along with a number of ex staff members.

On a sad note we lost a few Old Boys this past year. Both Liebie van Heerden and Norman Crookes were members of the 1948 cricket team here at Cordwalles; they were two of the five players that year who went on to represent South Africa. Wilbur Smith was another Cordies Old Boy who passed away a few months ago. These gentlemen all benefitted from the foundation that they received at our school. They went on to make us proud in their various accomplishments.

Lastly, Ron Nicolson, our Cordwalles Chaplain for ten years and a past school board member, passed away a few weeks ago. Ron will be remembered for his wisdom and humility.

Can we all stand and have a moment's silence to remember these great old boys and our loved ones we lost this past year to Covid-19.

Grade 7 leavers, in great tradition, I know you have enjoyed a special send-off. Thank you boys, for the leadership and the value you have added to Cordwalles; you have all endured many life lessons and created many memorable moments at school. We look forward to welcoming you back as Old Boys. Make the most of your high schools, thank your parents for this incredible opportunity and continue to build on the foundation you have laid at Cordwalles.

We have experienced another challenging year, with the uncertainty created by the Covid Pandemic. Although we only lost 16 physical days at school, the unknown made it difficult to roll out our routine Cordwalles programme. Interestingly, at the peak of the third wave, we had about eight boys who contracted Covid-19 but over 100 boys in quarantine and decided to close the school a week before the half term break.



Just when we thought things could not get any worse, so the looting and unrest in KZN brought on additional challenges. Although this took place during our school holidays, we felt its impact when three prospective boys chose to attend schools in other provinces. One family decided to go to Zimbabwe, along with six boys and their families deciding to emigrate at the end of this year. One of the positive observations of the looting was the incredible sense of community we enjoy at Cordwalles. We had parents and farmers offering their support. This ranged from pockets of potatoes and beans, to loaves of bread etc. Save Supermarket was, as always, most supportive. Our parents and teachers also volunteered to man roadblocks in our town and the farming districts, providing support to prevent further looting, damage and loss of life.

Our PA has made the most of the tough year. After the Hoatson family and their business Thirsti generously offered to sponsor our new Asambe series, our single most significant fundraising event, we had to cancel this due to the restrictions on social gatherings. The PA had a great interim plan and managed to organize a golf day at Victoria Country Club. It turned out to be a huge success and no doubt clear signs of people being starved of social interaction during the lockdown. The golf day raised R90 000. The PA also took on a great initiative to build 4kms of trails in our Cordwalles forest. Nic Floris, who designed the Olympic mountain bike track, assisted with this project. We did get to enjoy a memorable family day in the forest exploring these new trails. Thank you to all the parents involved in the PA. Your passion and enthusiasm for Cordwalles is appreciated, even more in the constrictive environment we find ourselves.

Some building developments... at the end of last year, we commenced building a new shed and garages in the workshop area at the back of the school. This is a vast improvement on what had been there previously and includes a storage area for the boys' bikes and a very recently tarred driveway.

Our exciting project for this past year was revamping our Art and Design and Technology rooms. A special thank you goes to old boy Ray Mkulisi for his generous donation towards this creative centre. We look forward to the official opening on the 11th February 2022 which falls on Old Boys' Day and the schools 110th birthday. Please don't forget to book your tickets for the dinner dance celebration that evening. We look forward to seeing you all there.

In our recent Board meeting, we have approved the purchase of a new minibus. Unlike our current bus, it comes with air conditioning, much to the staff and boys' delight. We are in the early stages of planning a revamp to our science laboratory. Many old boys here will notice that the current science lab has not changed since they were here.

With the troubled Msunduzi Municipality and Eskom, the Board feels it is essential for the school to be relatively self-sufficient in its water and electricity supply. With this in mind, we are in the final stages of discussion on installing a solar plant. This will support the school's electricity demands during daylight hours. It will also save us R3000 per day in fuel for our generator and is a start to a longer-term plan to move off the electricity grid.

We have also employed the services of a groundwater engineer and hydrologist to give us some advice on an alternative water supply. We are fortunate to have a few boreholes on the property. Still, again we need to have a backup facility, especially for the boarding house and kitchen. We are exploring installing several tanks for this purpose.

The Board has formed a Transformation Subcommittee. The committee's role is to provide strategic oversight and governance leadership of all facets of diversity and transformation at the school. Ray Mkulisi has agreed to chair this committee, for which we are most grateful.

Cordwalles is in a healthy space. Our academic programme continues to flourish under Duncan Greaves' guidance. Our boys enjoy the many benefits of a Cordwalles education, entrenching themselves in all aspects of school life.

We are looking forward to more competitive sport next year. This has probably been the greatest casualty of Covid-19, thinking that our U11 rugby players of next year have barely played a match.

Thank you most sincerely to our teaching staff, who know no bounds and continue to go above and beyond to educate our boys. Your dedication does not go unnoticed. Juggling infections, vaccines, lockdowns, online teaching, face-to-face, etc., has been tough, and I am well aware of the mental fatigue endured. Take these holidays to rest and restore your personal wellness.

Before I get onto our thank yous and farewells, I felt it is important to mention Ali Kingsley and the great work she is doing at the Amathuba Foundation. Amathuba means opportunities, and it is just that. In the past few years, I have mentioned both the Jackson Foundation and the Safire Scholarship Programme. When she left Cordwalles as a teacher, Ali took it upon herself to get hold of all the past beneficiaries of these various scholarships. The stories inspired her to start the Amathuba Foundation. The role of the foundation is to facilitate opportunities for learners at educational centres of excellence. The purpose of these opportunities is to bring out the best in these individuals by placing them in an environment in which they can thrive. The stories of these transformed lives will inspire their families and greater communities, with the hope that one day these learners will be in a position to contribute to social change themselves in South Africa. Ali, you are an inspiration, as are the boys who have benefitted from this programme. Please support Amathuba where possible and keep up the fantastic work Ali.

We are sad to be saying farewell to Ruth. Ruth arrived here in 2005 at a small school of 261 boys and just 35 boarders. She did not need a job description as she embraced Cordwalles in every aspect. Through Ruth's passion, determination and love for Cordwalles, she played a significant role in growing our school by over 110 boys. Our boarding increased from 35 to 86 boys. She was the female touch behind R40 million worth of building done in her time at Cordies, from curtains and linen to interior décor and landscaping. She was often seen in our grounds encouraging our boys and often the staff to clean up and look tidy. I even polished my shoes this morning. She cast her magic over our website, Facebook and Instagram, with many incredible photographs highlighting special moments and lasting memories.

The hugely successful Mudman Series was started when Ruth joined and between her and the PA, this has been a game-changer for our school. Ruth, you truly embraced the Cordwalles product and believed in it with such conviction. This conviction has led many boys and parents to our school, resulting in many eternally grateful boys and old boys.

Will everyone stand?

Ruth, on behalf of the Board, the staff, the parents, boys and old boys, we will forever be grateful for the impact you have had on Cordwalles. Thank you!

We have two changes to the Board where Ryan Zammit and Thabs Dube step down. Thank you, gentlemen, for your valuable contribution; we look forward to working with Mel Klute as the new chair and Nadia Marais as deputy chair of the PA

I thank Graham Evans for chairing the Cordwalles Trust for the past five years and his contribution to Cordwalles over the past 11 years. He has resigned and Kim Peddie has been appointed in his place.

A big thank you to Antoinette Hankinson, our Bursar. Apart from running the school's finances, she has the difficult job of collecting unpaid school fees. Antoinette, we are grateful for the continued hard work and support you give both the Board and the school.

Many thanks to our Cordwalles Board. Last week, it was great to have our first face-to-face Board meeting this year. Your wise counsel, support and dedication to Cordwalles is appreciated.

Last but not least, our Headmaster, Lance Veenstra. You have weathered another tough year. The role of a headmaster in a regular school environment is challenging at the best of times. These last two years have certainly been testing, and you continue to show great fortitude and resilience. Thank you for your clear and insightful leadership.

In closing, thank you parents, for your tolerance of these challenges that we have experienced over the past two years. Thank you for your continued support and for the fantastic opportunity you have given your boys. Wishing you a safe, restful and healthy holiday season.

Good morning Bishop Ndwandwe, Mrs Forder, Mr Veenstra, Mr Greaves, members of the Board, staff, parents and fellow Cordwalles boys.

Today I have the privilege of talking on behalf of my fellow leavers about all the wonderful years we have spent at this school. Although our Grade 7 year wasn't quite what we had hoped it would be, due to Covid, we have made the best of it even through all the struggles and disappointments.

Little did I know when I started in the Inky that these years would be some of the best years I have ever experienced.

"The deeper the foundation the stronger the fortress".

This is one of my favourite quotes. Not just because it is on the wall at the entrance to the Arsenal Stadium, but because it also reflects on our time here at Cordwalles.

For me, it highlights the word 'builds' in our motto, "Courage Builds Character". We have built our foundations for the future. We have laid down the foundations for so many things.

I think especially of the foundation of friendships. The friendships that we have built here will last through thick and thin. As we leave Cordwalles and go to our different high schools, it will be these friendships and the memories we shared that will bind us. And stay with us forever

We have created the foundations of our characters based on core values. From the very first day that any of us joined Cordwalles, we were taught Respect, Courage, Compassion, Integrity, Responsibility and how to be a leader.

Respect has been ingrained in us. Wherever you go, whatever you do and whoever you meet, show respect, it is the way to success. For me it has been a combination of all these important lessons that has taught me the most important life skill that I will take away from this school, and that is how to be a leader.

In our last Natural Science lesson Mr Rob asked us something interesting. He asked "Can any of you tell me what leadership means to you?" Not a single one of us could give a reasonable answer. Most answers went along the lines of having someone to control or give orders to. This didn't sound right to me. Leadership is more than authority and power. So I did some research. The Google definition of leadership is 'The action of leading a group or organisation, the state or position of being a leader'.

I guess that it is because of definitions like that, that we could not answer Mr. Rob's question. I looked further and I found this: "Leadership is about developing people and helping others reach their full potential." I think this is the real definition.

Leadership isn't about making people listen, it's about making them want to listen. Great leaders don't just lead their team to victory, they push them past what they thought they could achieve and they also realise what an honour it is to be THEIR leader. As a leader, every day you have the opportunity to make a change in someone. It could be a simple thing like asking how their day was or something like encouraging someone to pursue their dream. Cordwalles has nurtured the passion that is within us. We have been exposed to many varied choices and encouraged to find the thing that makes us feel fulfilled, the thing that makes us happy. We know what passion feels like, we just need to show it.

Mr Veenstra has given us a perfect example of how to lead and we just need to follow his example. The Springbok rugby captain, Siya Kolisi, had passion and led 15 men to victory in the World Cup and this passion has also spread around the nation.

"We didn't realise we were making memories, we were just having fun."



My passion this year, when doing assemblies with the boys, has been birds. I decided to link this with our ceremony today as we recognize not only the boys but Ms Khumalo, our Head of Academic Support who has played such a major role in so many of our little boys lives.

Here on the stage is my 'Tree of Treasures' and each 'treasure' symbolizes an inspiring quality we have seen shine through in Ms Khumalo.

The first treasure is the actual 'tree'. The birds build their nests in the branches of the tree. The tree puts out its branches to help the birds to have somewhere to nest. It is a safe place for them to build their nest. Ms Khumalo, thank you for being our academic support tree. Thank you for extending your hand to EVERY child that has needed you, just as a tree extends its branches for birds. You have never turned away a child and if you have not had the capacity to take on a new boy, you have made a plan for them to be accommodated. Here is a much smaller branch to remind you of your hands that have been outstretched towards each Cordies boy who has needed you. In a similar way, you have provided a safe place in your room, just as a tree is a safe place for birds to build their homes. Thank you for being there for our gorgeous boys who need you.

Our next treasure is a nest. Ms Khumalo, you have woven a nest for every boy in your care. Each nest has been carefully constructed by you to be perfect for each boy. You have chosen the material, games and methods you have used to ensure each little child is learning and growing as they spend time with you in their little nest. You have lined their nest with the coping skills, knowledge and the love that they have needed to succeed and develop. Just as a bird takes care to build the perfect nest, so you have done for our boys – thank you.

Our ostrich egg is a treasure too. Ms Khumalo, just as birds keep their eggs warm and incubate them, spending many hours doing so, so you have done for our boys in the academic support unit. You have ensured that each boy has had much of your attention and time in order that they are warm and growing correctly. Just like this hard ostrich egg shell that can withstand enormous pressure, you have done extremely well to flourish and maintain your cool with your heavy case load and with the demanding JP and Inky teachers as we pick your brain for ideas to help the little ones in our care be the best that they can be. You have a knack of remaining calm and go about your necessary business of doing what you need to do when the rest of us are maybe not as calm.

Let's look at the next treasure on our tree – feathers. Ms Khumalo, thank you for being the 'feathers' for our boys. And just as the Blue Crane is our national symbol for South Africa, you have been our Cordies symbol for the academic support unit. We were so fortunate to have had you for the four years you have been with us. Thank you for sharing your knowledge, skills and friendship with us. We have been blessed by your time here with us.

Our treasures have come to an end, our tree a little emptier. Ms Khumalo, we pray that you have woven a nest for yourself too, one that is filled with precious Cordies memories and friendships. May the ostrich egg remind you of your strength in difficult times and that the time you put into every child is rewarded with their achievements and successes as they grow and develop. May the feather help you fly into your future and new position, with confidence and a knowledge that this is the right move for you and Hlelo. The Blue Crane, may it be a reminder that you are a rarity, a most special lady. The branch that we are here for you, always, keep remembering to extend your hands and heart, as we will do ours, so that we can keep in touch.

Neliswa has made a huge contribution to Cordwalles and will be missed by the staff and boys and will always be a part of the Cordwalles family.
































GRADE

The work began and soon we had a pile of magnificent canvases which Mrs Bullock so patiently photographed and catalogued for our online auction which took place at the end of half term. Thanks to Peter Maskell, who so kindly offered us his auctioning platform, a whopping R70 000 was made for the art department!

The second term also saw us moving out of the old Art room into my temporary one in the foyer of the theatre. This term also saw the launch of the 'CANS can make a difference' competition. The aim was not only environmental awareness, but also to raise money for a dog to help track poachers in the Hluhluwe-iMfolozi Game Reserve. The boys were true to form and rose to the occasion in good spirit and bought in over 29000 cans, raising an amount of R5000.

Art has been used again to express the boys' unique talents. The programmes have involved multi-layered techniques which teach various skills and allow a unique and individual response from each boy.

Clay is a wonderful medium as it offers the opportunity to develop fine and gross motor control. It is also a medium that is forgiving of mistakes. Sculpture gives children the chance to perceive space and 3-D form in a new context.

The Grade 7 boys were fortunate to visit the Ardmore Studio in the Midlands to be inspired with pattern making and sculpture techniques.

The trip to the African Bird of Prey Sanctuary at Umlaas Road proved to be incredibly valuable. It not only equipped the Grade 6 boys with knowledge about owls, but also inspired them to observe the shape, texture and colour of the large variety of owls in the enclosures, setting them up for success in the owl sculptures that took place later in the pottery studio.

The Grade 4 boys were inspired by their visit to the Karkloof indigenous forests and the wetland for their biodiversity art piece.

Art at Cordwalles continues to grow from strength to strength and we look forward to an exciting 2022.


Our theme for 2021 was WATER. Over the week the boys participated in hands-on activities where they explored:

This quote sums up the theme for our Grade 7 Project Week this year. The boys were challenged to think about sustainability and how we can make our world more sustainable. Amongst other things, the boys were inspired by various clips and they had to research, design and build a sustainable house out of materials found around school. Once this was done they had the opportunity to feed back and face some questions about their models. We also looked at various projects around the world where sustainability and saving the environment has had a great impact. 



JUNIOR PRIMARY REPORT

We also spoke about the Wagtails I had seen raising a Red Chested Cuckoo in their nest and how they had to adjust to look after and care for this rather big bird.

Term 2 brought the theme of Hope. Hope is closely linked to trust and we spoke about a 'skydiving' kind of hope. The type of hope where we trust things will happen just as we hope they will, just as we trust that a parachute will open when we jump out of an aeroplane. We linked this to the Trumpeter Hornbill that visits the Fig tree in my garden. The female encloses herself in their nest in the trunk of the tree, leaving just a little hole, for the male to come and feed her while she cares for the eggs. She has an instinctive hope and trust that this will happen.

Attitude was the theme for Term 3. We discussed the Fruits of the Spirit and the attitudes we aspire to live by. We talked about the Yellow-billed kite and the Fiery-necked Nightjar and their positive attitudes; how they don't give up and keep going, looking for opportunities to get what they need in order to survive. We spoke about courage as an attitude which we all need, and we looked closely at our Cordwalles badge and our motto "Courage Builds Character".

Term 4 brought the theme of Love. We discussed ways in which we can show love to those around us. We spoke of the different kinds of love for family, friends and teachers. Watching beautiful love dances in the bird kingdom was entertaining, fascinating and amusing; the birds had us laughing at quite a few of their antics. The greatest love story in the Bible was read and we spoke about how God so loved the world that he gave His only son to us.

2021 has been quite a year. Just when we thought we could return to normal, we could not. What a blow! I can certainly praise each and every boy, intern and teacher involved in the Junior Primary this year. Yes, it hasn't been easy, but it has been a year where each person, big or small, has displayed a wonderful attitude. 

Once again there were many outstanding team and individual performances throughout the cricket season with a total of three centuries scored this year. OLD BOYS SIR TERENCE ENGLISH ARTICLE IN MIDLANDS MAGAZINE


stablished in
1912, Cordwalles
Preparatory School
has long been
proud of its enterprising and
successful Old Boys whose
careers span a diverse mix of
conservation, academia, sport,
business, literature, music,
medicine and science.

In this article, we look at the esteemed career of Sir Terence English, a retired cardiac surgeon who attended Cordwalles from 1943-1945 during the wartime years. Born in South Africa in 1932, his mother was a Lund whose family emigrated from Yorkshire on the ship Haidee arriving in Port Natal after a three-month voyage in 1850. Many of them became farmers in the Midlands. Educated at Cordwalles between 1943-1945 where he was in the 1st XV rugby team, Terence was part of a group of boys of that era who have played a prominent role and influence in many walks of life.

From Cordwalles, he moved to Hilton College and thereafter spent a year diamonddrilling in Rhodesia, he qualified in 1954 with a BSc in Mining Engineering from Witwatersrand University. A small inheritance allowed Terence to pursue a different path and he decided to become a doctor, qualifying in Medicine in 1962 from London University.

Having completed his specialist training at Guy's Hospital, first in general surgery and then in cardiothoracic surgery, Terence was appointed to Papworth & Addenbrooke's hospitals in 1972 where his main surgical interest became establishing a programme of heart transplantation.

After three previous unsuccessful attempts in 1968 by Donald Ross (another South African), Terence performed Britain's first successful heart transplant in August 1979. From then, under his leadership and as Director of the British Heart Foundation Research Group, Papworth achieved an international reputation for heart and lung transplantation. Terence has been part of the





Cordwalles Old Boys' Club since its re-launch in 2007 attending several UK reunions.

We are incredibly proud of our Old Boy and the extraordinary achievements in medicine and surgery in which he has played a major role.

We are particularly delighted that, some 76 years later, Sir Terence continues to be interested in his old prep school.

Tiny has always been an ambassador for Cordwalles, particularly in the East Griqualand area, through whom many boys have been guided towards Cordwalles. He served as the Boarder Representative on the Parents' Association where he brought expert knowledge of the boarding experience to Cordwalles.'

On many occasions, Tiny and his wife Lynn hosted our rugby tour parties at their home "Yonaroo" and during these visits Tiny gave the boys many inspirational talks on team unity and belief.

Farewell to Wilbur Smith – Cordwalles 1941 – 1947

Today we mourn the passing of one of our old boys, world renowned author, Wilbur Smith whose books have had such a far reaching

impact and brought much joy to so many people.

Born in 1933 in Northern Rhodesia (Zambia) he grew up and spent many hours exploring his parents' 25,000 acre farm where he learnt to hunt and observe and develop a respect for the wildlife around him. Here his sense of adventure was nurtured, not least of all through his mother's love of nature, painting and books. She encouraged him to read and he absorbed John Buchan, CS Forrester and Ryder Haggard.

At the age of 8, he was sent away to school and he embarked on the long train journey to board at Cordwalles in Natal, South Africa. Wilbur attended from 1941-1947 during the final years of the Besant era.

It is fair to say Wilbur endured rather than enjoyed school, but he caught the eye of his English teacher at the time, who spotted and encouraged the talent within. Wilbur was not inclined to sports but had a strong leaning toward the cultural side of life. In his last year (1947) he won the coveted Tatham Prize for English and it was at this point, according to his website:

"that was the first time that it entered my head that one day I might join the pantheon of writers and live on Olympus amongst them". It goes without saying that he fulfilled his dream in every sense, writing more than 40 books which sold over 149 million copies worldwide. Whilst his love of books was fostered by his mother, we are so proud that it was at Cordwalles where he saw the dream of becoming a writer take flight.

In the school archives we are honoured to have probably the first printed piece that Wilbur wrote entitled "The Monarch of Ilungu" which featured in the School Magazine of 1947, in which his writing style is clear to see.

We send our deepest condolences to his wife, Niso and to his family, friends and fans worldwide.
